John Griffin Barber was married a second time after the death of Lucy Long (Moore) Barber. He married Nancy Bibby, June 30th. 1873. Nancy Bibby was born Nov. 21st. 1835 and died May 22nd 1903. She is buried at Harkey's Chapel at his right side and Lucy Ann Long at his left. Nancy Bibby had not been married before and their were no children born of this union between herself and John Griffin Barber.

John Griffin Barber was a private in the Confererate Army. He was a member of CO. #E. 51st. Regt. Ala. Calvary. He enlisted on Aug. 11th. 1862. On Oct. 13th. 1863 he was captured in Farmington, Tenn. After the previous bloody battle of Chicamauga. After his capture he was transported by Union Officials to Camp Morton, Ind. war prison. He spent the balance of war time in this prison under the deplorable conditions told of in your history books. Camp Morton was second only to Andersonville (prison for Union soldiers in Georgia.) Camp Motton Ind. Larger city libraries have the book written by Indiana Historical Society "Title: Camp Morton.

At Camp Morton the men were starved, there was much disease, and severe cold weather. At the end of 1863 and Jan. & Feb. of 1864, Indiana had a winter blizzard with the following consequences to the Confederate prisoners. Records kept at the prison, show in Dec. 1863, that there were 91 deaths and 244 sick in the barracks. In Jan. 1864, there were recorded 104 deaths and 251 sick. At the end of Jan. 1864, inspection was made and the number of sick in the hospital was 240 with 706 ill in the barracks. Nine men died in one day. A later monument erected to mark the burial place, noted 1,616 Confederate soldiers had died here as prisoners of war. Most of the deaths being during the periods listed above. The recorded top temperature for New years Day 1864, was 12 below Zero. The temperature rarely warmed during this winter to any more than 17 degrees above Zero.

John Griffin Barber lived to return home and tell of these hard times. He was discharged or released March 10th. 1865.

His wife Lucy Ann Long Barber had managed to feed her children and grow cotton which she hid from raiding Union soldiers. She had a colt born on the farm which she traded for cotton. She is recorded as saying at the time "Cotton does not have to be fed." When John Griffin returned home he took this hoarded cotton, built a raft and floated it down the Coosa river to Wetumpka. Cotton was in high demand, shortage by war time and burning of the fields by the enemy etc. He traded the cotton for Coffee, Sugar and other items, returned home and opened a store. He owned and managed this store until his death in 1907.

John Griffin Barber's first wife spoken of above was married to a Mr. William Moore before her marriage to John G. Barber. As Lucy Ann Long (Moore) she had two girls. Mary Luthenah Moore born 1841.

And Eliza Jane Moore was born, 1843. Mr. Moore died and she married John G. Barber when the girls were small children. Eliza Jane was only 3 years old. John Griffin Barber became legal guardian of these girls.

Lucy Ann Long (Moore) Barber's parents were Naomah and Rubin Long. Naomah Long was a Fortner before marriage. She died June 1st. 1853. Rubin Long died Feb. 7th. 1856. Rubin Long came to St. Clair County from Virginia with his family to obtain land granted to him after serving in the War of 1812.

Reubin Long was a Private in the company of Capt. Reuben Tankersley 30th. Regt Virginia Milita. He enrolled near Fr. Norfolk, Dec. 28, 1812 and served until April 11, 1814.

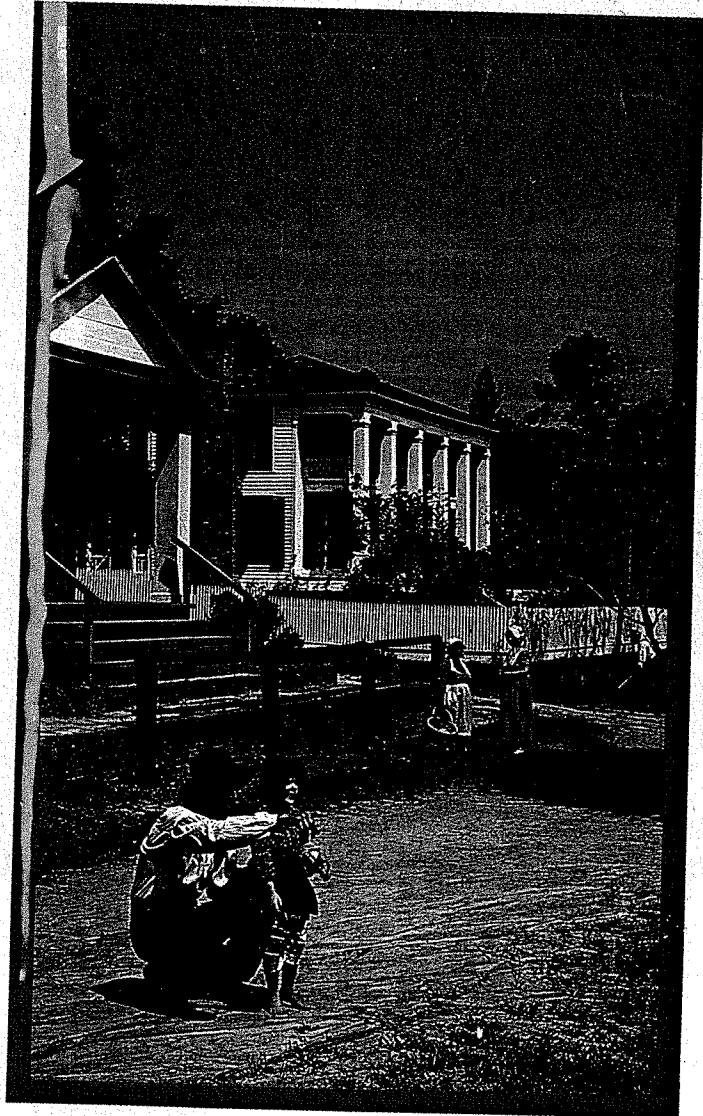
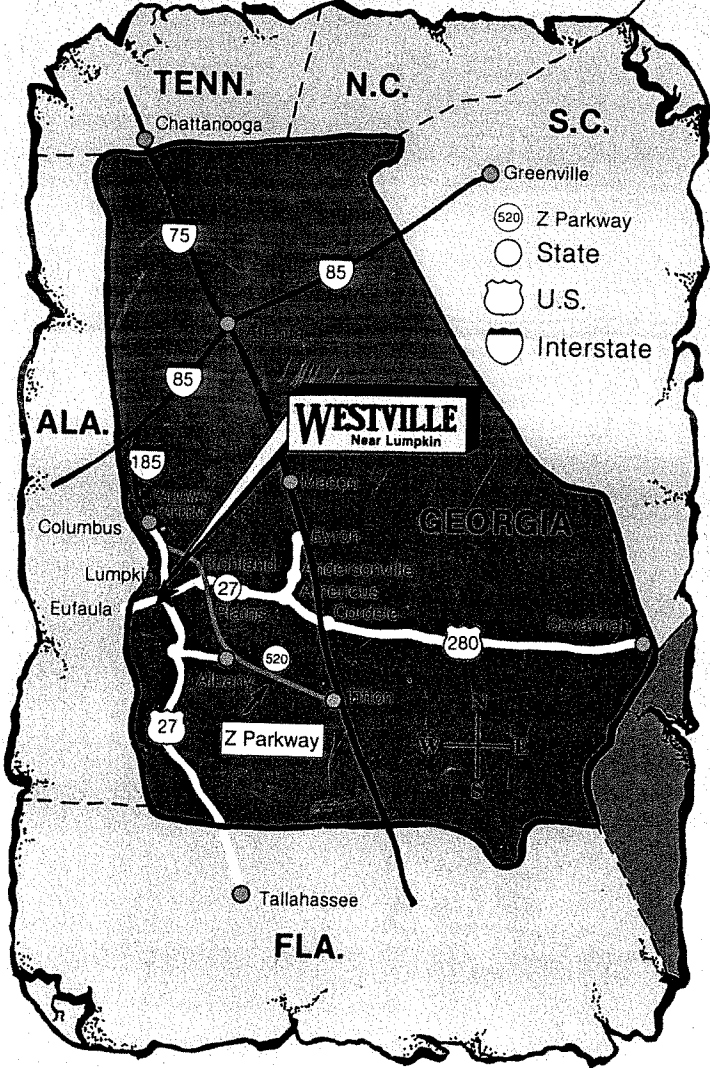

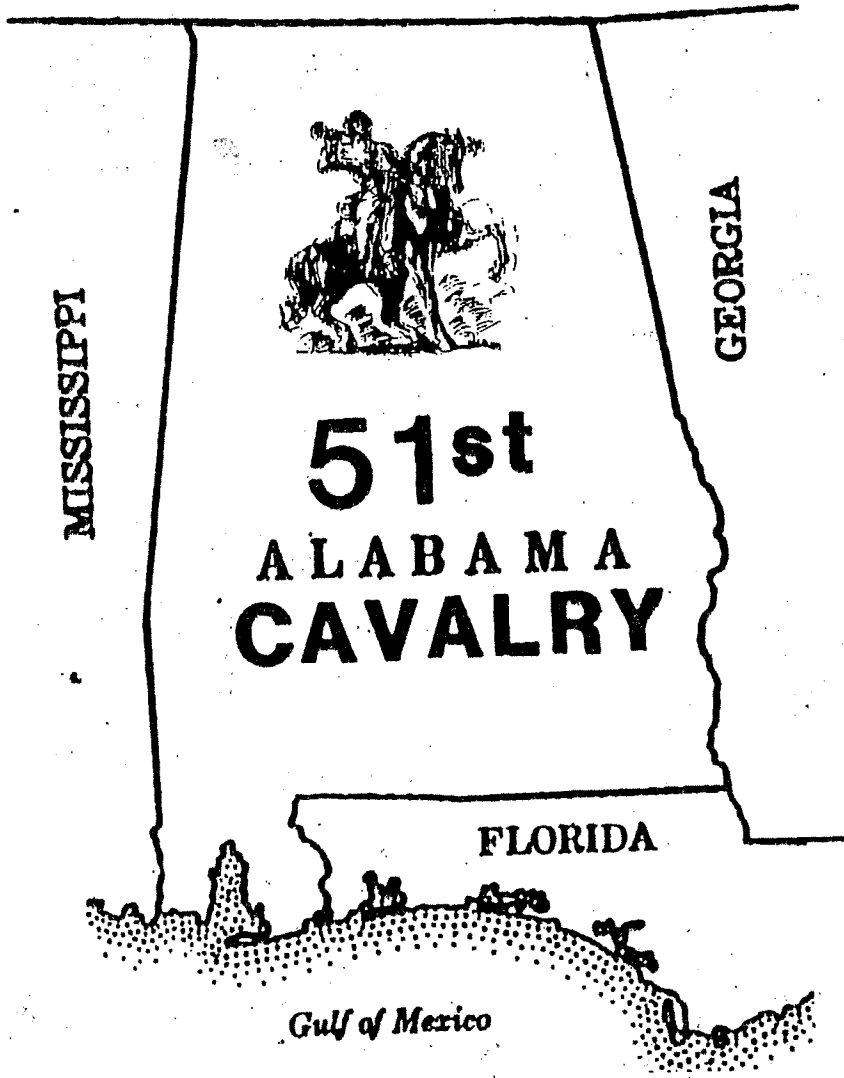

Barber must have done some strong talking and was a very strong man health wise, for after the depestation was made for him to stay 30 days on the orther card, this card shows that he was furloughed to go home March 13th. 1865. From here he went home on flat cars. Per information gathered by Casen Barber, The rail read flat cars had 2 x 12's fer seats. His family records show that he arrived in Talladega, Ala. on March 15th. 1865. The cars arrived their around 11:00 from Anniston or oxford where he had enlisted. John G. told and Casen Barber recorded that it sleeted and snowed on them enroute to Talladega that morning of March 15th.

She went to his house often and cleaned it and prepared food for him. She was a good wife and mother. Amanda Melvina Barber Vaughan is buried at Harkey's Chapel Methodist Church Cemetary ,Coal City,Ala. in St. Clair County.

Amanda Melvina Barber's parents were John Griffin Barber and Lucy Ann Long Moore. They were married on the 30th day of June 1846 at Broken Arrow by a Rev. Berry Rhodes.



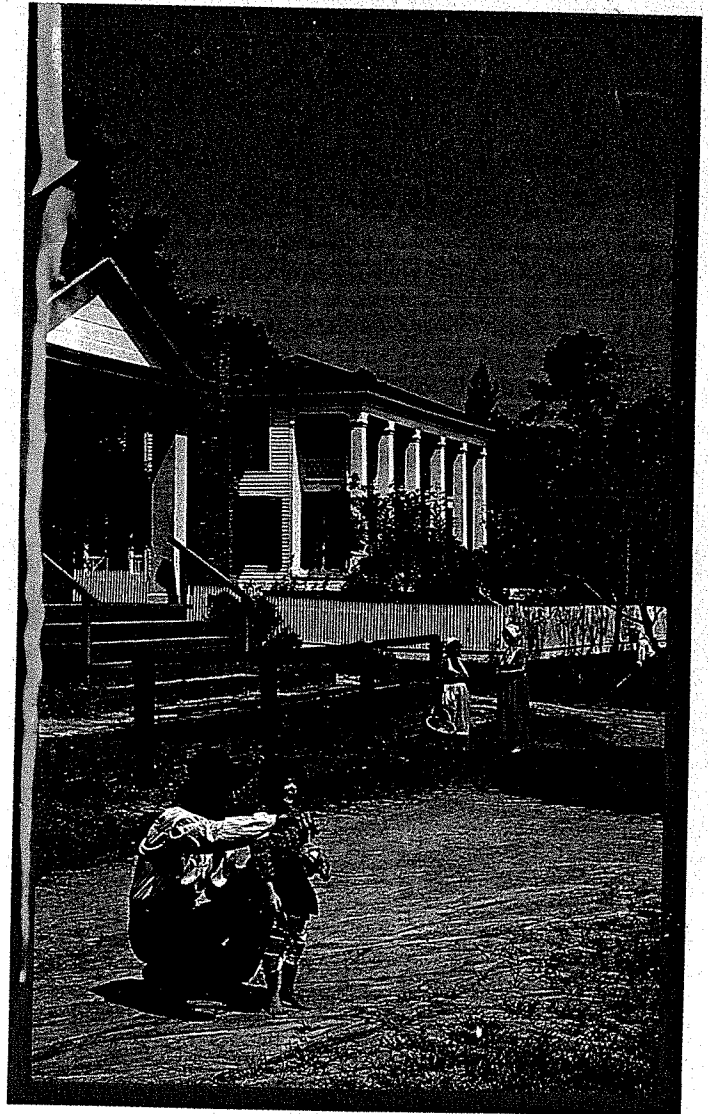
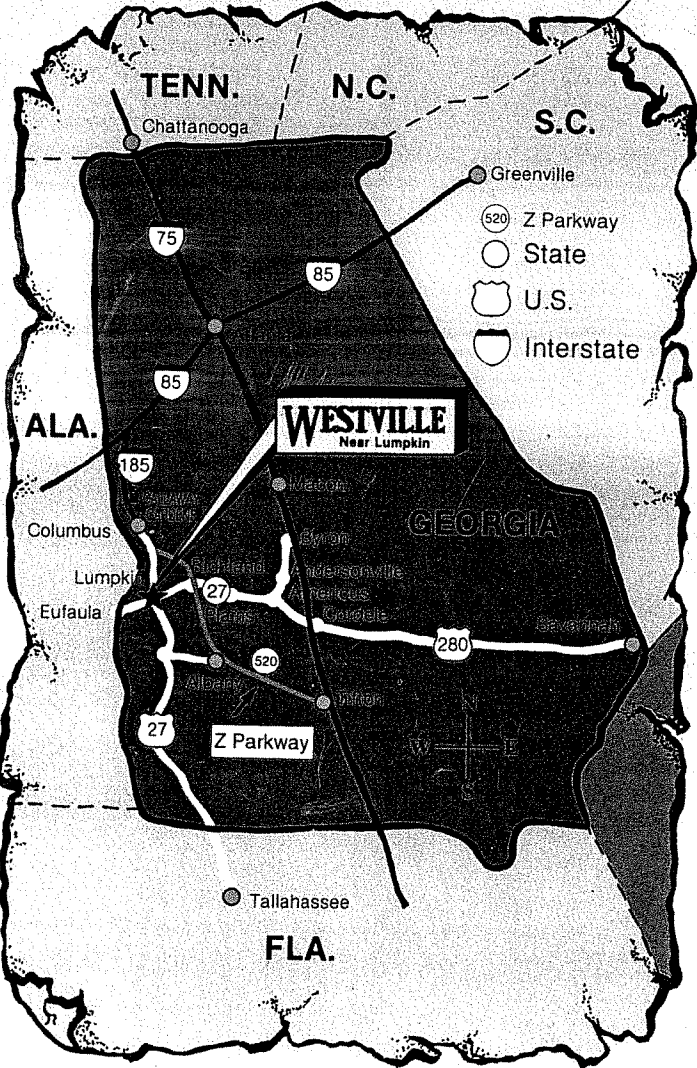
