ST. CLAIR BUILDING SCHOOLS

PELL CITY, Dec. 31 — Work has begun on St. Clair County's largest school building program in history.

Education Superintendent Hugh H. Williamson said new projects are underway at Pell City, Ashville and Ragland which will cost \$1.034.000

which will cost \$1,034,000.

The Pell City project includes new junior high school with 17 classrooms, adminis-

trative offices and auditoriton-gymnasium and new high school gymnasium. RAGLAND WILL HAVE

RAGLAND WILL HAVE eight new classrooms, cafeteria, administrative offices and gymnasium-cafeteria.

The Ashville contract calls for a new high school, home economics and vocational agricultural departments, administrative offices and

gymnasium-cafeteria.

Building is being done through a 20-year extension of a five-mill tax voted on by the county electorate.

Williamson said the contract should be complete by October, 1966.

City To Barricade Streets Leading To High School, Duran

In an effort to prevent a congested and hazardous condition at Pell City High School and Duran Junior High School, the Pell City Council Monday night approved a plan which will barricade 12th Street and Second Avenue South in the area around the schools from 8 a.m. to 3 p.m. each school day.

A barricade will be placed on 2nd Avenue, South, on the left side of Duran, one will be placed at the entrance to 12th Street just off Highway 78, one will be placed on First Avenue South at the entrance to 12th Street and another will block a driveway which runs around the back of the high school.

Mayor Hugh Williamson said the plan had been worked out with officials of the two

Mental Health Authority, added his comments to Dr. Doran's, asking the Council to consider the request.

Heard Sherman Hill, a resident of the Billy Walker Subdivision in the Seddon community, ask that an approximate two-block long road to his property be chirted by the City. The Council referred the matter to the streets committee for study.

STANDARDS FOR STUDENTS

- 1. All teachers have the same authority over all students. Students will obey all teachers at all times.
- 2. A student may be suspended by the principal for a maximum of three (3) days during which they will receive no credit for those days, nor will they be allowed to make up work missed during the period of suspension. Following reasons:
 - A. Fighting on the busses, in school buildings, or on the school grounds.
 - B. Students leaving school without permission, cutting classes while at school, or not attending school after leaving home to attend.
 - C. Poor attitudes, insubordination, and undesirable behavior or language expressed toward their peers or faculty.
 - D. POSSESSION or USE of fireworks, knives or other lethal weapons.
 - E. Defacing or destroying school property or equipment.
- 3. To be reinstated in school following a suspension, there must be a conference between the principal, the student and his/her parents, and any other person whom the principal requests to be present.

- 4. Students will not be taken from class or excused from school except in an emergency. The principal must have contact with the parents before the student leaves. Under no circumstance should a student leave the school grounds without a permit from the principal.
- 5. All absences must be accompanied by a doctor's or parent's written statement of excuse that the child was not able to attend school. AFTER TEN ABSENCES only a doctor's statement or a death in the immediate family is acceptable reasons for excused absences. Absences beyond these ten days is automatic failure during either semester.
- 6. No visitors are to be allowed in classes without written permission from principal.
- 7. Students should go to home rooms as soon as possible after entering the building in the morning.
- 8. Students should not be in the halls during class periods without a pass. They should go to lockers and rest rooms during the breaks between classes.
- 9. Students should not go to the lockers or rest rooms during the fourth period (lunch).
- 10. Students, whether eating or not, must go to the lunchroom at the assigned time.

- 11. Students are to be counted tardy if they enter the room after the tardy bell. (Exception: Late bus)
- 12. Students will avoid familiarity and petting anywhere at school, or on the school grounds.
- 13. Students will not use the school telephone.
- 14. Students are NOT to chew gum at Duran Jr. High.
- 15. No smoking in the school building or on the school grounds.
- 16. Students are not to bring radios to school.
- 17. GIRLS: Students will be well groomed at all times. No shorts, slacks (of any type), pedal pushers, or see throug garments will be worn at any time other than those special occasions as designated by the Principal and Faculty. Girls should be dressed in a ladylike manner at ALL times.
- 18. BOYS: Students will be well groomed at all times. No shorts will be worn at anytime other than special occasions designated by Principal and Faculty. Shirts will be worn inside trousers at ALL times. Clean shaven at all times. No beards, goatees, or mustaches will be tolorated at any time. Haircuts will be off the eyebrows, ears and out or the collar at all times.

- 19. Married students must receive special permission through their Principal from the St. Clair County Board of Education in order to attend school.
- 20. Extra curricular activities are an integral part of the total school program and students are expected to behave in the same manner as if they were attending an event during the school day.
- 21. Absolutely no activity such as boycotts, picketing, demonstration or any other form of protest that in any way interferes with the normal school operation will be allowed. Any student instigating and/or participating in any of the activities such as is designated by the Principal or his appointed representative to cause a disturbance in the school or on the campus or on school busses will face automatic suspension and possible expulsion.
