Grand Jury Report Be Void

Through his attorney Robinson, Howard Thompson, filed a motion with the court this week to expunge the court's record of the recent Grand Jury report against Thompson.

The St. Clair County Grand Jury report was recalled by Judge Frank Embry Dec. 16, on the basis of a charge of wholesale violation of the law in St. Clair, returned by the Grand Jury which "urged our cooperation" in the case named, "the limit which Howard Thompson set for himself."

In his move to have the report expunged or thrown out of the court records, Thompson says that no indictment was returned against him, but the Grand Jury "did illegally attempt to return certain criticism of your petitioner."

The petition further stated "Each of the criticisms leveled at your petitioner by said Grand Jury report was without warrant or authority of law and without legal basis, and the commission of a crime by your petitioner. Said report takes to masquerade of a judicial proceeding, and in fact it is not any judicial action, but a mere statement, and therefore has no place in the records of an honorable court."

Judge Frank Embry said that the report would be heard in the next session of the grand jury, which is expected to meet in the next few days. The Ark and the Spaw will be held Jan. 23.

A Million Miles And 40 Years Comes To An End

The last run has been made. The last letters and packages have been sorted and bundled. The last mail bag has been locked up—and now Bryce Inzer can spend at least part of his time thinking back over 40 years as a railway mail clerk.

He can look back over approximately 1 million miles of travel, roughly 40 times around the world—taking care of the mail, seeing to it that the letters and packages went to eager recipients.

In more than a million miles on the railroad he was never in a wreck, but has that time the mail car caught fire to think about. Not much damage, but a fine nevertheless. Then there was the time a box of baby chicks fell out of the car while the train was running about 50 miles an hour. Although badly scattered in the fields the children were recovered by a freight train crew and delivered to customers with no loss of interest.

Mr. Inzer retired last week. He made his last run on Christmas Day and the following day, a total of 100 miles— from Birmingham to Mobile and returned he had been out for three years.

Born on the 13th of June, 1913, at Pell City, Ala., he attended school at Pell City and Pell City, was a member of the Pell City High School and a member of Birmingham Medical College.

"Two things happened in 1912," Mr. Inzer said, "that had much to do with my future life. First my daddy died. Then two of my boyhood friends, H. E. Laney and H. C. Harless very earnestly urged me to join them in preparing for and taking an examination for the Railway Mail Service. I did not think too much of this at first. I had hoped to continue my medical education. But since the death of my father I was not sure." Prior to the mail job he had taught school two years, the last year at Cropwell.

He eventually passed the examination and was appointed a clerk in December 1913. H. C. Harless also passed the examination, worked as a Railway Mail Clerk until his death several years ago.

Mr. Inzer's first run was from Birmingham to Atlanta. He was later transferred to the Rome-Meridian run and in Nov. 1918, was transferred to the Birmingham-Mobile run where he remained.

He retired voluntarily, about six years before he would have had to quit. "I decided to retire now," he said, "to be able to give more of my time to my work in the ministry. I re-dedicated my life in 1934, as a christian. Over a 10 year period at Eden I made my largest contribution to the Lord's cause." He has been serving as a minister for about 14 years at churches in St. Clair, Clay and Shelby, has been pastor of Harpersville Baptist for three years and started full time pastorate there Jan. 1.

Mr. Inzer employed his off time while in the mail service in selling real estate, and later after he and Mrs. Inzer moved back to Eden
