According to the Jasper Headlight, some time since 150 of the coke ovens at Jasper were leased to the Lady Ensley Furnace company, who own the furnaces at Sheffield, and since that time they have run to their fullest capacity. But it seems that this number was not sufficient to supply the demand for coke, and another 100 of the ovens have been fired up. This puts in blast 250 ovens and there now remains only 100 idle.

The Pell City Globe says: "At the special meeting of the stockholders of the Pike Manufacturing company, held at Kittery, Me., it was decided to sell the company's property and dissolve the corporation. From this date Paphro D. Pike, president of the company, with others, will continue the business heretofore done in Boston under the name of the Pike Manufacturing company, and Otto B. Cole, treasurer of the company, with others, will continue the business at Pell City under the name of the Southern Foundry company. Telegrams received from Mr. Cole say that he will arrive in Pell City this week, and it is expected that the works will be gotten into shape for immediate operation."

A BIG PLANT REMOVED.

The Hercules Pipe Mill Preparing For Their Location in Anniston.

Anniston, April 13.—(Special.)—The Hercules Pipe Works will be moved from Pell City to this place. A deal to that effect was closed to-day and the plant will be moved at once. The Hercules Company has a paid up capital of \$100,000 and at present is employing 100 men.

When the removal is made the force and capacity will be doubled. The product of the plant is sanitary pipe and the company has a constant demand for its entire output.

Grading will be commenced on the new site to-morrow morning and the work of removal will begin Monday morning. It is hoped to be able to have the plant in operation again in five or six weeks.
