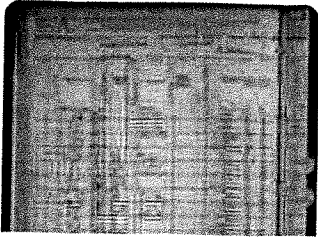

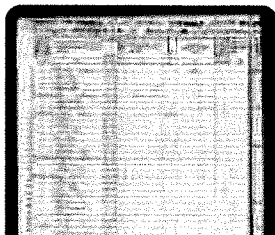

in Company *I* of *58th* Regiment of *Ala. Vols.*

*1864*, at *Chon Creek* in the State of *N. C.*  
he *was shot in the left hand*  
*taking off all his fingers*

and in consequence of which loss of limb wound or wounds, he has been rendered physically incapable of making a livelihood by labor; that he was a resident of Alabama on the 13th day of February, 1891, and is a resident at the date of this application; that he is engaged in the business of *farming* that his taxable property does not exceed four hundred dollars in value, and that his Salary and Gross Income does not amount to four hundred dollars per year.

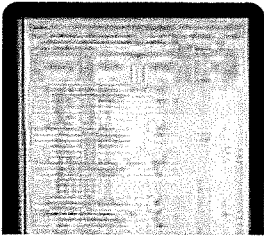

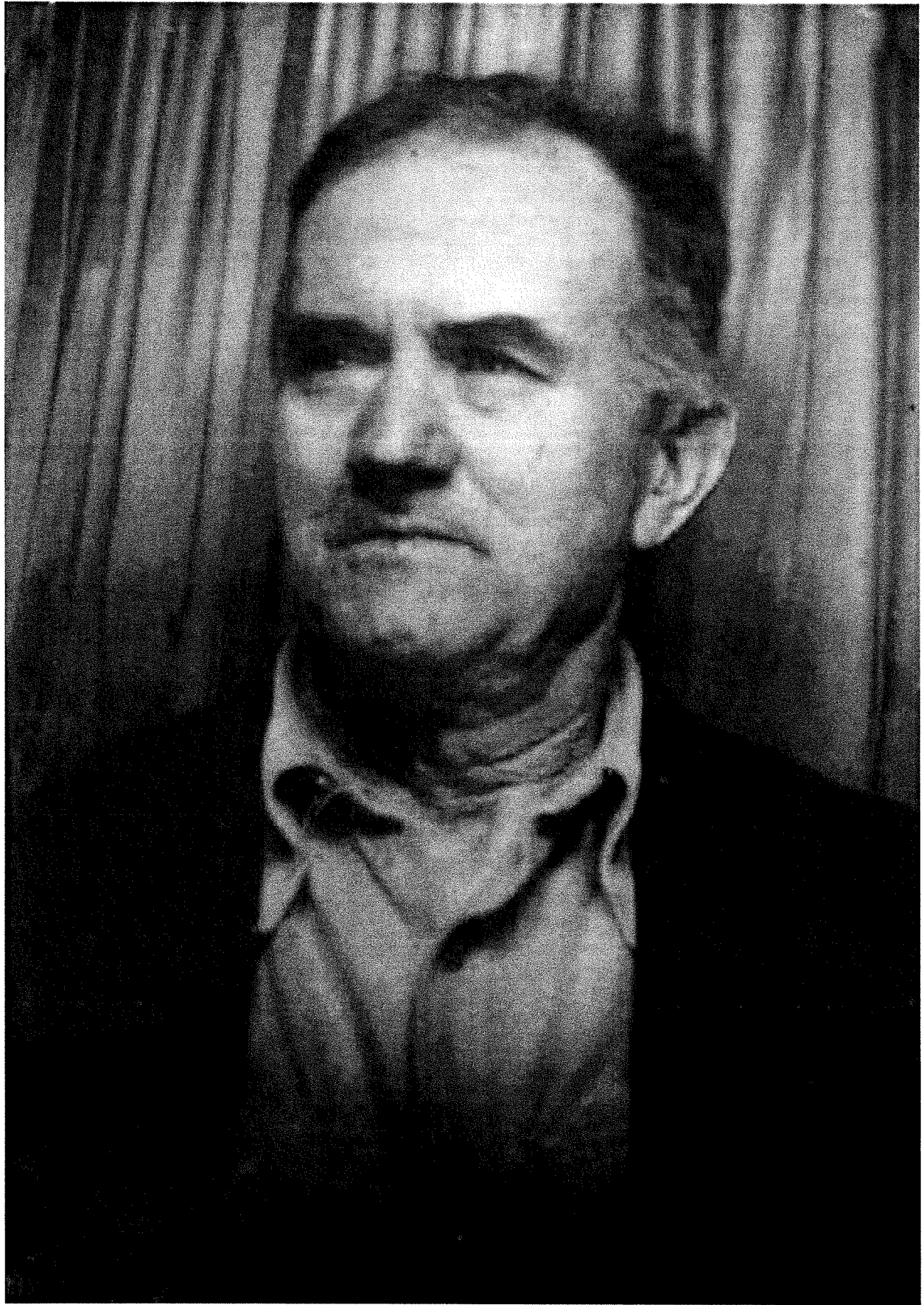

*The deputy prosecutor said an attempt was made to get \$25 from the Spokane store last week and that store officials consulted his office.*

*The History Of Lakeland Village (Lakeland Village, Medical Lake Washington)*

*In January of 1915, Lakeland Village, known then as the "School for the Feeble Minded," was opened at its present site. 252 males moved by horse-drawn wagon from the old site on the grounds of Eastern Washington Hospital for the Insane (Eastern State Hospital) where they has been housed since 1906. Prior to 1906 the only facility for the "feeble minded" was the School for Defective Youth in Vancouver, established in 1892.*

*Female residents moved to the new site in February 1917. The Population increased to 620 by 1918 and reached an all-time high of 1654 in 1938. The farm operation produced all vegetables, grain and ensilage used by the institution, 60% of the eggs, all pork, all milk and cream.*

*In 1939 Western State Custodial School was built on the west side of Washington. (Rainier School at Buckley). The state was then divided geographically and Lakeland was renamed Eastern State Custodial School. The change in name to Lakeland Village occurred in 1947.*

*The facility has undergone many changes both physically and philosophically through the years. Old dormitory style buildings were remodeled several times and then finally replaced with smaller cottage style homes. The population has decreased to 259 (February 2001). The purpose of the facility has changed from care and custody for the "the happiness of children" to providing active treatment for habilitation to an adult population.*

On being introduced there, the president of the Oakland chapter commented on her name and mentioned having known an O. B. Karr who had been teaching band in high school at Rolla, N. D. Mrs. Karr immediately identified the band teacher as her husband's brother. He had been her band teacher when she was in school in Oklahoma.

When she told her husband what she had learned, the search began and through various hometown newspapers in localities where Ben had lived and taught music, they were able finally to contact him in Spokane. The Washington man then planned the trip here with his wife and two daughters, Mary and Diane, his wife's mother and a niece, both from Minnesota. The two brothers spent a week together comparing events that had occurred during more than half a century of separation. Not the least among surprises learned by the band teacher was that his brother had married one of his former pupils.

Stu's Notes: There is a memorial plaque for WWII at Chico State University, I know because it took me a while to find it, sadly Lt. Cary's name is not on it, maybe because he only went there a year. He was forgotten. Our Memorial will put his name in stone. Mrs. O. E. Karr was a Gold Star Mother because she lost her son, Corporal Everett M.  "Whitaker State Children's Home, located in the southeast section of Pryor Creek . . . was founded in 1897 by W. T. Whitaker, a Cherokee Indian, to care for the white orphans left behind in the Great-Oklahoma-Land-Rush. The children were cared for at Mr. Whitaker's own expense until 1906. Although there were numerous donations, the operation of the Home depleted Mr. Whitaker's entire resources. In 1903 the Cherokee Orphan Home in Salina burned and the children were taken to the Whitaker Orphan Home. In 1906 an act of Congress provided funds to care for the Indian orphan children. The First Legislature after Oklahoma became a State enacted a law which authorized the State to take over the Whitaker Orphan Home in Pryor Creek in 1908." Under direction of the state Board of Affairs it operated as an orphanage until 1961. 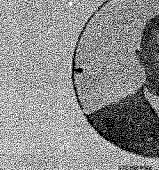
