Pell city has 'athletic' day

PELL CITY, Ala., Dec. 8—Yesterday was a big day for Pell City athletics. Two honors came to the undefeated, untied Pell City High football team and last night a drive was inaugurated to build a stadium.

The first honor was the official presentation of The Birmingham News plaque for the best Class AA team in Section Three (Districts Five and Six). Following that ceremony during which Coach Will Glover accepted the plaque from News representative, Alf Van Hoose, Jack DeGaris, a Pell City business man, also awarded the school a beautiful trophy. This was given by the people of the city.

Both presentations were made at a banquet sponsored by Pell City people at the Black and White Gardens, a restaurant near here.

AT THE AFFAIR Ed Blair, Pell City publisher, served as toastmaster, and Borden Burr, widely-

known Birmingham attorney, made the principal address.

Burr's remarks had to do chiefly with the current situation in college athletics. He said the ills that beset collegiate sports these days could be cured with three measures:

1. Put coaching staffs on same level of security and administration as other members of the faculty.
2. Require football players to live up to scholastic standards.
3. Comply with the rules of the conference to which a school belongs.

THE DRIVE for the stadium began following the banquet attended by players, school officials, cheer leaders and townpeople. Officers were elected to head the drive which will take the form of stadium-certificate investments.

James Bukacek was elected to head the drive; Edmond Holladay was named vice president, and Clayton Alexander, secretary-treasurer.

The board of directors includes Pat Robinson, Bill Purdy, Ed Blair, Blair Jones and Jack DeGaris.

Currently the team is using a stadium owned by Avondale Mills which is inconveniently located in regards the school.

IN ACCEPTING The Birmingham News trophy, Glover praised the spirit and cooperation of his entire squad which won 10 straight games. Glover, in his second year at Pell City after a college career of football and track at Ole Miss, taught the split-T.

Pell City was one of eight undefeated, untied teams in the state. The team was the second of eight which will receive News plaques.

Earlier this week Oneonta was awarded the first one and now Demopolis, Pine Hill, Elba, Abbeville, Reform and Dora are scheduled to follow.

Backs — Ken Hestley, Jimmy Scott, Terry King, Pat Patterson, Eddie Thomas, Everett Taylor and James Moore.



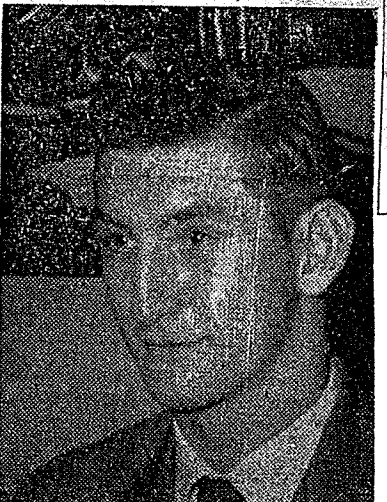

Anniston, Ala., (Special The Good Sportsmanship trophy for 1951 was awarded the Pell City High School football team by football official of the East Alabama Official Association at their annual banquet held here Tuesday night.

R. D. Tenant, president of the association, made the presentation which was received by Prof. E. H. Childs, principal, and Will Glover, Coach in Pell City. The Panthers drew only one personal foul during the 10 game schedule.

Mr. Tenant will formally present the trophy to the entire student body at Pell City High Friday morning at 10 o'clock. The public is invited to attend the presentation exercises.



The trophy was bought with money donated by local fans and will be on permanent display at the high school. It has inscribed on it the names of the entire squad and Coach Glover, and the words, "Presented to the Pell City Panthers. Unbeaten and Untied, 1951."

Alf Van Hoose, sports writer of The Birmingham News, presented the team with The Birmingham News trophy denoting division championship in the "AA" group of Alabama high schools.

Second picture shows Borden Burr, noted Birmingham attorney, who delivered the main speech at the banquet. Mr. Burr, who played quarterback on the Alabama team in 1895, told his audience that college athletes on an average were more successful in later life than those who did not take part in athletics. "Taking part in a high school or college sport teaches discipline, perseverance and above all loyalty," Mr. Burr said. He decried the talk about over-emphasis in athletics, but said no team could be expected, nor was expected to win every game. Tram Sessions, all-Southern center at Alabama in 1923, attended the banquet.

Bob Golden, Pell City's all-state end, is shown in the lower picture. University athletic authorities announced last week that Golden had signed a grant-in-aid scholarship and would enter the University next fall.

James Bukacek was elected first president of the new Pell City High School Alumni Association. Edwin Holladay was elected vice-president and Claxton Alexander, secretary-treasurer. All three play-

ed football when students at Pell City High.

The Alumni group will have as its objectives all possible aid to the cultural, educational and athletic program at their high school. One of the firststeps will be investigation of possibility of a football stadium to be located on high school property.

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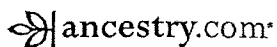

Burnham, Cyclones Blow Away Past

His 68-year old eyes were witnessing history, but there was still 4:03 remaining. Nebraska had the ball and he knew this was far from over.

Four plays later, Iowa State's [Michael O'Connell](#) intercepted Nebraska's [Zac Lee](#). It was the seventh turnover forced by Burnham's over-achieving defense. The [Cyclones'](#) sideline went nuts.

There was still 2:51 remaining.

"I'm thinking 'Dang, if the offense makes two first downs we can win this thing,' " Burnham told FanHouse.

Four plays later, however, Nebraska forced a punt and Iowa State's defense trotted back on the field needing to make one more stop.

For Burnham, it all started in Pell City, Ala. He grew up in a square house -- as he says "on the wrong side of the tracks" -- with two fireplaces that burned coal to keep the house warm. It was in Pell City, a small town located about 30 miles west of Birmingham, where Burnham learned the importance of hard work at the age of 16 while working two eight-hour shifts a day inside a cotton mill.

That lesson still remains with him today.

"That taught me work ethic and there are certain things you have to do in life to make it," Burnham said.

In the 1950s, Alabama state laws prohibited children from working in the mill until they were 16. But on the first Saturday after Burnham's 16th birthday in 1957, Burnham headed to the mill. It's something he'll never forget.



"I'd have a football game Friday night, then work at the cotton mill from 6AM. Saturday to 2PM," Burnham said. "Then we were required by state law to take eight hours off. I'd return Saturday night at 10 and work until 6AM Sunday then take eight hours off and go back Sunday at 2PM until 10 or 11 at night.

"We'd clean the entire mill, the floors, machines, get the lint off everything, if something needed painting. Whatever they wanted us to do, we did it. It's something I would never chance. It was quite an experience."

Nothing like the experience of playing for Bear Bryant.

"It was kind of like being a Marine," Burnham said.

Before Burnham played two years for the Bear at Alabama, he was one of the state's top -- and toughest -- linebackers, said his high school coach Will Glover.

"I just had to try to get him from tackling out of bounds," Glover said laughing.

Glover, now 86 and living in Jackson, Miss., fondly remembers Burnham's final high school game: Pell City at Talladega for the mythical state championship.

In the fourth quarter, Talladega pulled within one on a touchdown and lined up for the game-tying extra point.

"Wally rushed through and blocked the extra point and then ran into the kicker," Glover said. "Even though it's not supposed to be a penalty because he blocked the kick, they called him for roughing the kicker. Boy was he mad."

Burnham then blocked Talladega's next attempt.

"This time he really ran over the kicker," Glover said. "He knocked him unconscious."

Burnham was ejected, by "the hometown referees" Glover said, and Pell City eventually lost.

Losing was an epidemic at Iowa State before Burnham joined new Iowa State coach Paul Rhoads this year. The Cyclones had lost 19 of their last 24 games and lost 14 consecutive Big 12 road games. Yet here were the nearly three-TD underdogs, playing without the Big 12's leading rusher and their starting quarterback in Lincoln, Neb., less than two minutes from knocking off Goliath.

Iowa State didn't get the couple of first downs Burnham wanted so badly, giving Nebraska the ball back at its 18. The Cornhuskers only needed a field goal for the victory.

Burnham paced the sidelines. This is his 44th year coaching and he's been on both ends of every comeback known to man. His defense, the same defense that last year was the nation's 10th-worst scoring defense, had to come up big one last time.

"A program that hasn't won in a while, sometimes it gets used to losing," Burnham said. "I could see 10-9 on the scoreboard. That would have been the most devastating thing."

Nebraska threw three consecutive incomplete passes. Then on fourth-and-10, Lee flung it downfield, but Iowa State's Jesse Smith was there for the game-clinching interception. Burnham immediately started bear-hugging anything that moved on the sidelines as the Cyclones celebrated one of college football's biggest upsets of the year.

"As a coach, you want to say you can coach in a game like that, that means this much," Burnham said. "It's big when you go beat an Alabama or Penn State. It's the same kind of deal in the Midwest against Nebraska. I wanted this for the kids, especially the seniors, who are on their third head coach. They've been through so much the last five years.

"This was something they could take from the program. We told them if you do this, this will be something you remember the rest of your lives."

The Cyclones are 5-3 and only one win from becoming bowl eligible. They actually could be 7-1. They lost to Kansas State 24-23 on a missed extra point and at No. 16 Kansas 41-36. The other loss was to undefeated Iowa. Jayhawks safety Darrell Stuckey has noticed a big difference in the Cyclones this season.

"The team is very disciplined," Stuckey said. "They're buying into the new coaches' philosophy. They're doing a phenomenal job. They're a threat in the Big 12. They play hard and never give up."

Never give up. That's always been a trait of Burnham and his defenses. He's been coaching longer than six of Iowa State's other eight assistants have been alive.

Burnham began coaching in 1965 as a graduate assistant at Livingston College (now the University of West Alabama). Shortly afterward, Burnham got married -- he and his wife, Barbara, will celebrate their 44th wedding anniversary Dec. 4 -- and had to take a high school job "to keep from going broke."

He planned to coach a few years then become an administrator. Forty-four years later, he's coached numerous NFL linebackers in college such as Derrick Brooks, Marvin Jones, Kawika Mitchell, Jesse Solomon and Stephen Nicholas, and worked at places such as Memphis State, the USFL's Arizona Wranglers, Florida State, South Carolina (the only place he got fired) and South Florida.

Burnham is still going strong.

"On the sideline during the game, he's the most fired up person out there," said USF defensive end George Selvie, who Burnham coached the past four seasons. "He's on the sideline with us talking trash. You'd think he'd be a calm dude, but he has that fire in him."

In February, Burnham left USF after nine seasons. Under Burnham, USF ranked in the top 30 in total defense in six of the past seven seasons. One reason he left Tampa, Fla., for Ames, Iowa, was the chance to coach with his son, Shane, also in his first season as ISU's defensive tackles coach. Burnham prefers to keep the other reasons private.

"This is a new challenge for him," Shane Burnham said. "He's re-energized and revitalized. He's working for a new head ball coach. He's ramped up that way to build something again."

That building project got a huge boost with the win at Nebraska.

"Dad was so thrilled," Shane Burnham said. "Our feet didn't touch the ground until Sunday morning. It was unbelievable. I think he would rank it up there with some of the program building wins with USF, winning at Auburn, and at Florida State, when they beat Nebraska and Michigan. Big-time wins that helped build those programs."

Last season, Iowa State surrendered 35.8 points and 453 yards per game. This year under Burnham, ISU is allowing only 19.8 points and 383.6 yards per game. The Cyclones also are second in the nation in takeaways (24) and lead the Big 12 in turnover margin (+9).

Wally Burnham said when he got to ISU one thing stood out: "we weren't a very good tackling team." That has changed.

"When you go into a program like this that was down, you realize a lot of minds that are not going to be sold on the coaching staff, especially the older guys," Burnham said.

"From an athletic standpoint, you could see we had some deficiencies in speed, quickness and size. The only way to [overcome] that was to work hard, teach them the concepts you want to use. The kids have always tried hard and put a lot of effort into it. We haven't gotten much faster or much bigger, but they understand our concepts."

Burnham, who has worked under 12 head coaches, said Rhoads is as good as there is.

"He's never too high, too low and doesn't panic," Burnham said. "He gives the players tough love. You couldn't ask for anyone any better.

"Thank God he's a defensive coach and understands what we're going through. He never interferes with the defense. We sit down talk and share ideas. It helps me. It's been great so far -- knock on wood. He's a great leader. He does as good a job after a game as anyone I've been around."

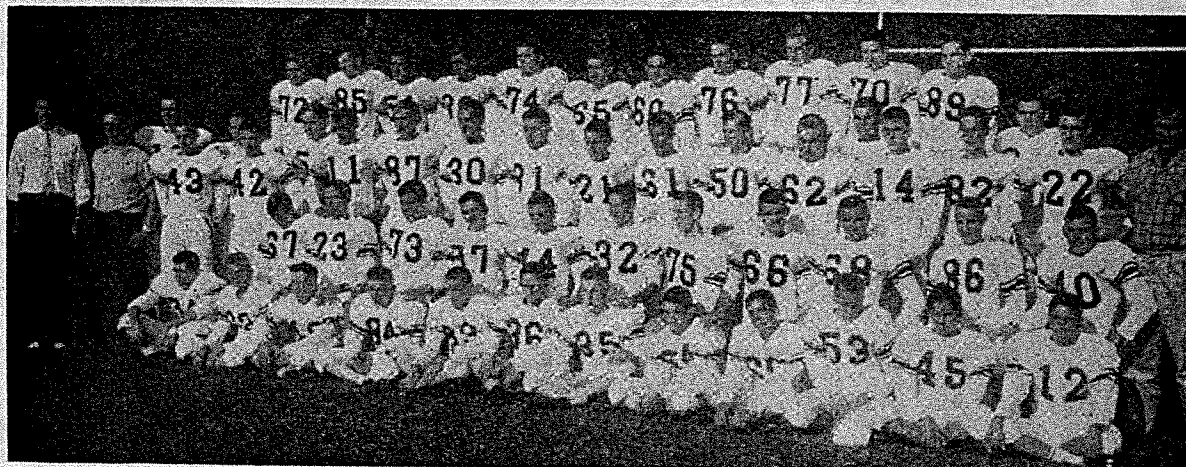

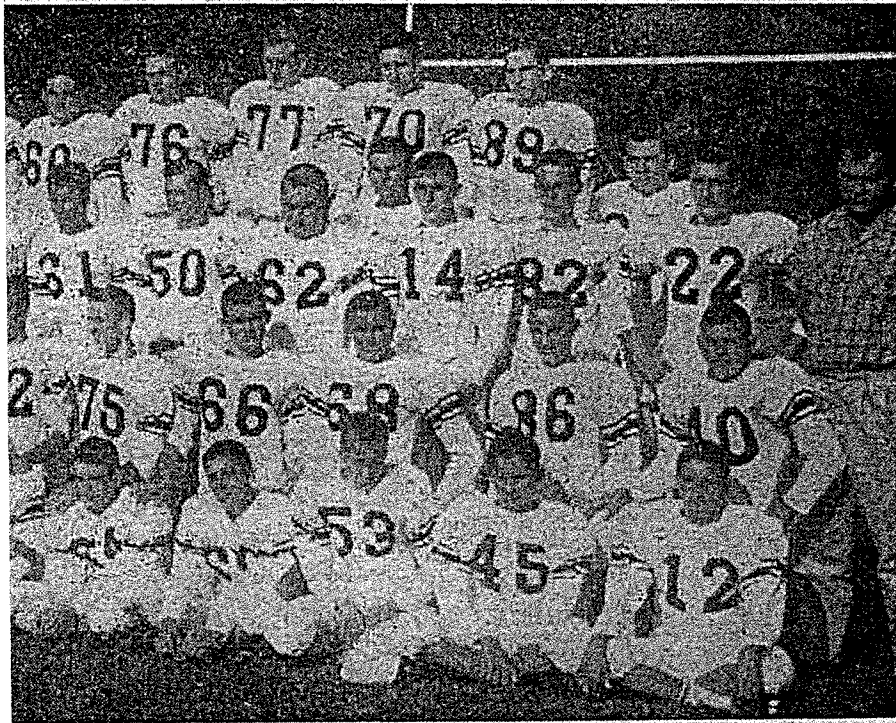

Where are they now? Will Glover

For 13 years, he roamed the Pell City Panther sideline as head football coach. Now, 58 years after taking over the Panther program, Will **Glover** is still considered one of the greatest football coaches in the history of the school.

Early life

Born May 2, 1923, **Glover** was one of 12 children, the son of a farmer and lay minister. His love for football started at an early age. He was so fast and quick that he started playing varsity football in the seventh grade.

These were days during the depression and **Glover** was needed in the fields alongside his dad.

According to **Glover**'s son, Bill, his dad was not a rebellious teenager but his grandpa whipped him every time he came home from practice because he needed to be working in the fields.

"However, my dad loved football so much, he took the whippings until grandpa finally gave up," Bill **Glover** said.

High School

Glover attended Hale County High School in Moundville. He was an All-State tailback and scored 60 touchdowns his final two years in 1941-42.

He needed only one more semester to graduate but at the age of 18, he decided to join the Navy before he was drafted.

Entering the service...and playing football

Glover was sent to Sand Diego, California for boot camp in December 1942.. What was supposed to be a 16-week boot camp turned into 12 weeks because the war was so close to starting.

Members of the base found out **Glover** had made All-State as a football player in high school and invited him to play football for San Diego Training.

"The captain of the base was an old Notre Dame man and he wanted me to go to Notre Dame when I got out of the service," **Glover** said. "At that time, I wanted to go to Alabama. Moundville is only 12 miles from Tuscaloosa and I was afraid I would not be eligible to play in college. I did not want to take a chance."

In four games, **Glover** scored seven touchdowns for San Diego.

World War II

From San Diego, **Glover** headed overseas. Over the next 27 months, **Glover** was the landing craft operator in three South Pacific invasions and landed marines at Treasure Island, Bouganville and Guam.

"I was put in the worst part of the Navy," **Glover** recalled. "The last invasion was Guam and then the war was over."

Glover was sent to a training station in Rhode Island for two months once he returned to the states. From there, he was sent to New Orleans for six weeks and then on to Memphis where he was discharged Jan. 1, 1946. All total, he spent 37 months in the Navy.

Where to go?

When spring training started at Alabama, **Glover** was there but he said Crimson Tide coach Frank Thomas was a peculiar man.

"He told me to wait until August and I could start with the rest of the team," **Glover** said. "I did not want to wait and Red Drew talked me into going to the University of Mississippi.

At Ole Miss

Glover said he liked the idea and signed with Ole Miss. He made the 1946 traveling squad but did not see much playing time. He weighed 180 pounds when he went into the Navy and three years later, he weighed 156 pounds and was 6-foot, 2-inches tall.

"It took me a year to get my speed back," **Glover** said.

1947 season

Glover saw a lot of playing time in 1947 at running back and safety. The Rebels went 8-2, won the SEC title and defeated TCU 13-9 in the Delta Bowl that was played at Memphis.

His coach was John Vaught and **Glover** called him one of the smartest coaches ever.

The head football coach at Kentucky at the time was Paul "Bear" Bryant who made a trip to Mississippi twice to meet **Glover** but missed him both times.

"I did not want to play at Kentucky, **Glover** said. "I was happy at Ole Miss."

Honors

Glover lettered during his sophomore season. He was named the SEC Back of the Week for his performance against Vanderbilt on Oct. 7, 1947.

Also that year, he set a single-game punt return yards record, a record he held for 55 years until it was broken by Jason Armstead in 2002. He still holds the Ole Miss record for punt return yards in a season and that record has stood for 60 years.

He also held the Ole Miss record in track for the 220-yard dash for 36 years until it was broken in 1984 by Olympian Tony Dees.

One of the greatest things to happen to **Glover** after that sophomore season was the offer that came from the NFL.

"The Pittsburgh Steelers offered me \$13,000 to play with them but I would have lost two years of eligibility," **Glover** said. "Besides, I wanted to be a coach."

Stayed at Ole Miss

Glover did stay at Ole Miss but in 1948, a spot was found on **Glover**'s lungs and doctors thought he had tuberculosis. Needless to say, he did not play football in 1948 or ever again and was sent to a VA Hospital in North Carolina.

Even though it cleared up in about a month with antibiotics, doctors would not release **Glover** to play football. The VA declared his illness service connected due to his run down state when he returned from the war. In the early 1950's, when he went to the VA Hospital for his annual check up, there was no evidence of lung scarring that goes with tuberculosis.

Getting degree

Of all of the siblings, **Glover** was the only one of 12 to get a college education. He graduated from Ole Miss in 1950 with a bachelor's degree in physical education and a minor in English.

From there, it was on to coaching.

Getting to Pell City

Glover's son, Bill, said his dad went through Pell City late one night by train while in

college and saw the school and town.

"He thought to himself that Pell City would be a great place to coach," the younger **Glover** said. "I do believe that a Mr. Howell from Moundville was the reason my dad went into coaching. He was the principal of Hale County High School and took over as football coach when the regular coach went into the service during the war. Mr. Howell later became president of the bank and loaned my dad enough money to move he and my mom to Pell City for his first coaching job. Needless to say, my dad had no collateral."

Becoming Pell City's coach

"I wanted to be a coach all my life," **Glover** said. "The best thing that ever happened to me was going to Pell City. I had good material the years I was there.

Glover's first year as Pell City coach was 1950. The Panthers were coming off a season where they did not win a game. **Glover**'s first year saw the Panthers go 3-5-1. It was the start of a beautiful relationship.

1951 to 1955

Over the next five seasons, **Glover** led the Panthers to three undefeated seasons and a five-year overall record of 42-4-2.

"We went 6-3 in 1952 and I should not have lost a game but we were busy building the stadium," **Glover** said. "In 1953, we went 9-0 and teams were scared to play us. I remember the Oxford coach coming to watch us scrimmage and he left saying they would not play us."

A wealth of talent

Glover said he ran out of material after the 1955 season but he had some great players in the early 1950s.

Tootie Hare was one of the best defensive players I ever had," **Glover** said. "Robert Wayne Skelton was one of the finest quarterbacks a high school team could have.

Charlie Gray caught 60 passes his senior year and Skelton threw everyone to him. Pete Rich was as tough as they come. Wayne Spradley was one of the best, easiest boys to coach and a great defensive player. He gave 100 percent. I had a lot of good players.

Terry Turner was a good football player and got a scholarship to Auburn."

Six of **Glover**'s Pell City players signed with Alabama and six more signed with Auburn.

Coaching career

Glover's entire coaching career was spent in Pell City. The last year he coached in Pell City was 1962.

"I had other offers but I never would leave because the fans in Pell City wanted me to stay. I had plenty of opportunities to go elsewhere. Albertville and Heflin just to name two. Albertville wasn't bad but I did not want to go to Heflin."

His overall 13-year record at Pell City was 80-40-6. He never beat Sylacauga, beat Talladega only once but beat Leeds 11 out of 12 years.

"I've always been a strong winner and a weak loser," he said. "I think I went to Pell City at the right time. I made the best friends I ever had right there in Pell City."

He would have coached longer had he not started having health problems.
