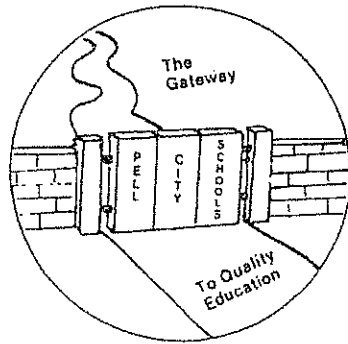


1890 CELEBRATING THE 1990 Centennial

The town was officially incorporated in May of 1911. The town began to attract industry, principally the Hercules Pipe Co. D.A.R.E. PROGRAM OFFERED

Pell City Police Officer Harold Carswell has been selected to serve the Pell City School System as the D.A.R.E. Program Officer. D.A.R.E. is a rigorous national drug abuse resistance program that targets elementary children. Officer Carswell spent eighty hours of intense training in Huntsville where he was named the Outstanding D.A.R.E. Trainee. He will be teaching seventeen lessons to all fifth grade classes throughout the school year. He will also instruct two lessons with all children in grades Kindergarten through third grade and four lessons with all fourth graders.

The program is designed to help children make the right choice concerning drugs. The lessons will deal with self-esteem and problem solving. The lower level lessons deal with meeting strangers and home safety. It is also designed to be a combined effort between the Police Department, community, and education. Officer Carswell will work directly with Karen Hand, Coordinator of Pell City Community Education, Jeanie Ennis, Pell City School System Drug Education Program Coordinator, and Sara Beth Blair, with the Friends of Children. He will also work with each school guidance counselor.

Officer Carswell will conduct a Parent Information Workshop on Thursday, October 4 at 6:00 P.M. Parents

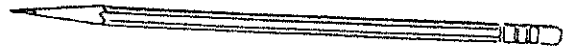

TEACHERS AND STAFF GO TO CLASS

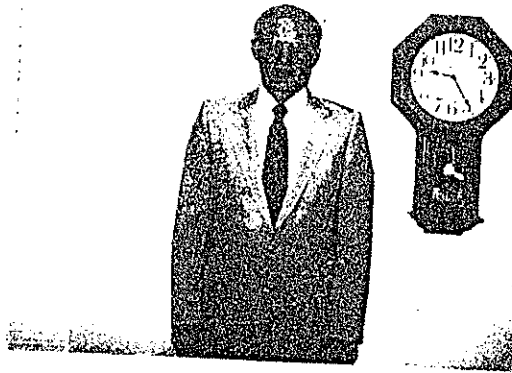

DR. WASHINGTON RETIRES

Dr. Hoyt Washington, Superintendent of Education for the Pell City School System has retired after nearly 32 years of service in Alabama. He has assumed the position of Superintendent of Education in Baldwin County, Georgia.

Dr. Washington began his career in public education as a classroom teacher in Jefferson County where he taught P.E., algebra, and social studies. He had been offered a position in St. Clair County at Ragland High School by former Superintendent of Education George Eden but turned it down because Jefferson County paid more. As fate would have it, Mr. Eden was on the first Pell City Board of Education eight years ago when the decision was made to hire Dr. Washington as the first Superintendent of Education in the newly formed Pell City School System.

During his career as an educator in Alabama, Dr. Washington held various positions including assistant principal at Erwin Jr. High, director of Gardendale Area Vocational School, principal at Springdale and Gardendale High Schools and in the Central Office for Jefferson County Board of Education where he supervised eight high schools and developed the Systems Management office.

Dr. Washington stated that his greatest accomplishment as Superintendent of Education in Pell City was that "We, not I, set a climate for moving towards excellence and expectation of excellence. We used the team approach which included the Board, principals, and teachers working together."

BOB PRAYTOR SELECTED AS INTERIM SUPERINTENDENT

Rising to the top in the educational community is usually slow and time-consuming. However, Mr. Robert Praytor happened to be at the right place at the right time this summer as he ascended to the top of Pell City's School System. Mr. Praytor has served as an assistant to Dr. Hoyt Washington until the retirement of Mr. Smitty Lee in late June. He was selected as the new Assistant Superintendent of Education in July. Things started happening rapidly when word reached the ears of the Board of Education that Dr. Washington was also going to retire. It was decided that Bob Praytor was the man of the hour as he was chosen to serve as the Interim Superintendent until one could be chosen.

Mr. Praytor is a Samford University graduate. He holds both a B.A. and Masters in History and Religion with a "B" endorsement in Elementary and Secondary Education. He also has an "A" endorsement in History and English with post-graduate work towards "AA" certification from Samford, the University of Montevallo, and the University of Alabama at Birmingham. Mr. Praytor has completed a sixteen-course diploma program in the field of Pastoral Ministries and Counseling.

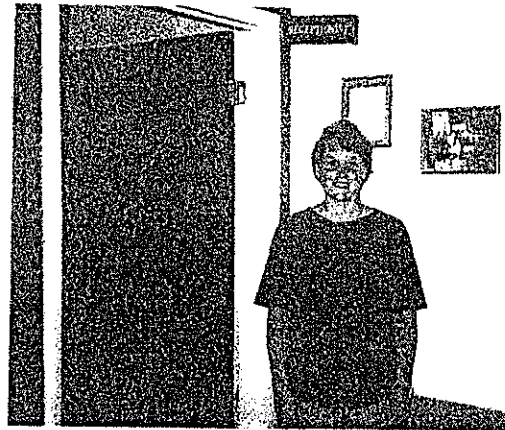

How about seven hamburgers, two large orders of fries, a fish sandwich, two apple pies, a milk shake, a chocolate sundae, and a large Pepsi. At least that is what PCHS senior Jamie Davis ordered during her recent trip to the U.S.S.R. No, this was not her last meal. It was a meal that she could save part of to eat later when the food served was less than appetizing. After waiting more than an hour and a half while 300 to 500 people were served, Jamie decided to make the best of her time by ordering plenty.

Jamie was selected to represent Pell City for the annual People to People tour which is sponsored by Gov. Guy Hunt, Clima White, Billy Rhodes, and Sue McKenny were the chaperones for the three-week tour which included such famous sites as Lenin's Tomb, Red Square, St. Basil's Cathedral, and the winter and summer palaces of Peter the Great. The group even visited the city of Kiev where they were instructed not to eat or drink anything, nor were they allowed to touch any of the flowers, trees, or fruit. THIRTEEN WAYS TO HELP YOUR CHILD MAKE BETTER GRADES

1. On the first school night of the week, ask to see your child's lesson plans for that week's class assignment in each subject.
2. Generally teachers require that a student keep a notebook. Ask to see notebooks each night, and see what work has been done in class and what work has been assigned.
3. Ask to see the textbook for each class each night. Even when there is no written homework assignment, there are new definitions, new rules and new material to be studied and memorized.
4. Assign a specific time and place, if possible, the same time and place each night for study and have study and homework done where you can observe your child. Check to see that work is completed and correct.
5. See that TV, radio, and stereo are turned off during study time.
6. If your child is having difficulty, read over materials with him. Read to him and have him read back to you.
7. After you have read material, ask questions to see that he/she understands what has been read. If he does not understand material, go back over it with him until he does.
8. Call out vocabulary words, usually printed in dark print in the text or listed separately in notebook, and let your child define or explain them and spell them to you.
9. Help your child study for tests. Ask questions from the text or notebook and ask general questions about the chapter or material. At LEAST one hour should be spent studying for any major test.
10. Keep up with your child's grades. Ask how he came out on a test on the evening after the test. Ask to see test scores. If scores were not what you would have expected after having worked with your child, call the school office and set up a conference with the teacher either by phone or in person.
11. Listen while your child practices oral reports and make suggestions on improvements.
12. BE INTERESTED IN YOUR CHILD AND ENCOURAGE HIM.
13. DO NOT DO YOUR CHILD'S WORK FOR HIM.

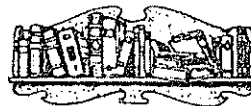

GED AND ADULT READING OFFERED

The Coosa Valley Adult Education Center will continue to offer Adult Basic Education at the St. Clair County Library in Pell City on Tuesday and Thursday evenings from 5:00 - 8:00 P.M. Instructions are offered in both GED preparations and basic reading.

Mrs. Adonis Fisher is the instructor of the GED Program. All materials and instructions are FREE, and students may enroll in the class at any time. They must be seventeen years of age. To be eligible for the GED test the student must be at least eighteen and out of school one year.

The Adult Reading Program is designed to teach adult non-readers or poor readers to read at an adult level. Ms. Brenda Smith is the instructor. Volunteers are needed to help adults learn to read.

Pell City Council Member James McGowan and Adult Nutrition Specialist Linda White have begun a "Save Our Children" campaign in Pell City. The campaign was started this summer in an effort to offer the children in Pell City choices in their lives that can lead to a more productive future. Both community leaders have expressed concern over the rise in teenage crime, youth gangs, and a lack of drive for a successful life by some of the youth in our community.

Mrs. White has been busy organizing an effort to unite the citizens in Glen City to have more pride in their community by cleaning up the area. The children in the community also met this summer to outline some of the ways to attain the goals they have set for themselves for the future. Mrs. White and Mr. Gowan have emphasized Education as the key to competing in the job market of tomorrow.

A community talent show, sponsored jointly by the "Save Our Children" organization and Pell City Com-

munity Education, was held at Kennedy School on Aug. 18. The money raised will be used to rebuild the playground located in Glen City.

An after-school "Latch Key" program is offered as an alternative program for children in need of after school care for children in grades one through eight. Mrs. White has been hired by the Pell City Park and Recreation Board to work with the children after school. The after school program is located just across the street from Kennedy School in the Adult Nutrition Center and is open to all children in Pell City. Unfortunately, there is only space for twenty-five children at this time.

Mrs. White has stressed that the "Save Our Children" organization is open to all children. She feels that the children of Pell City belong to each and every one of us, regardless of color or national origin. They are our future.

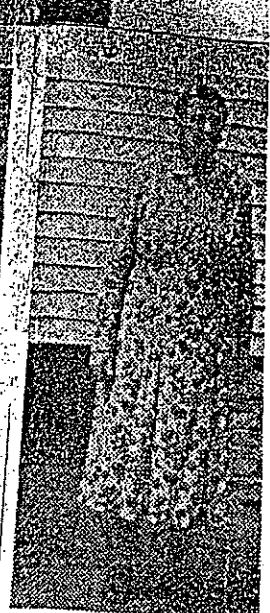

Richard Ely spoke to the Commission about the November 10, 1990 Centennial Veteran's Day. These plans were made:


1. The Commission will attend the command reception at Pell City High School at 9:00 a.m.

Centennial Celebration Committee

January 21, 1990

The Centennial meeting was called to order by chairman Hugh G. Williamson.

The minutes for the December 10, 1989 meeting were read by secretary, Amelia S. Williamson. The minutes were approved and filed.

Jerry Gallups introduced Tryus Wood Jr. who made a presentation of his desire to write and coordinate video production, Celebrating the Past-Fulfilling the Future. This video concerns Pell City's past and future.

After the presentation was made, the committee asked questions concerning the production. The following information was confirmed:

1. That the time frame of the video would be 18-20 minutes.
2. That interviews of People in Pell City would be used in the video.
3. That the Celebration Committee would have access to all overshoots.
4. That duplications could be made available to the committee for half price and that these duplications could be sold.
5. That the total Costs of this video would be \$5,920.

George Williams made a motion that Tyrus Wood be allowed to make the video at the cost of \$5,920. Jerry Gallups seconded the motion. The motion was carried unanimously.

Wayne Spradley, Pell City's renowned artist, has donated to the Centennial Commission, sketches of five of the city's most historical buildings that no longer exist.

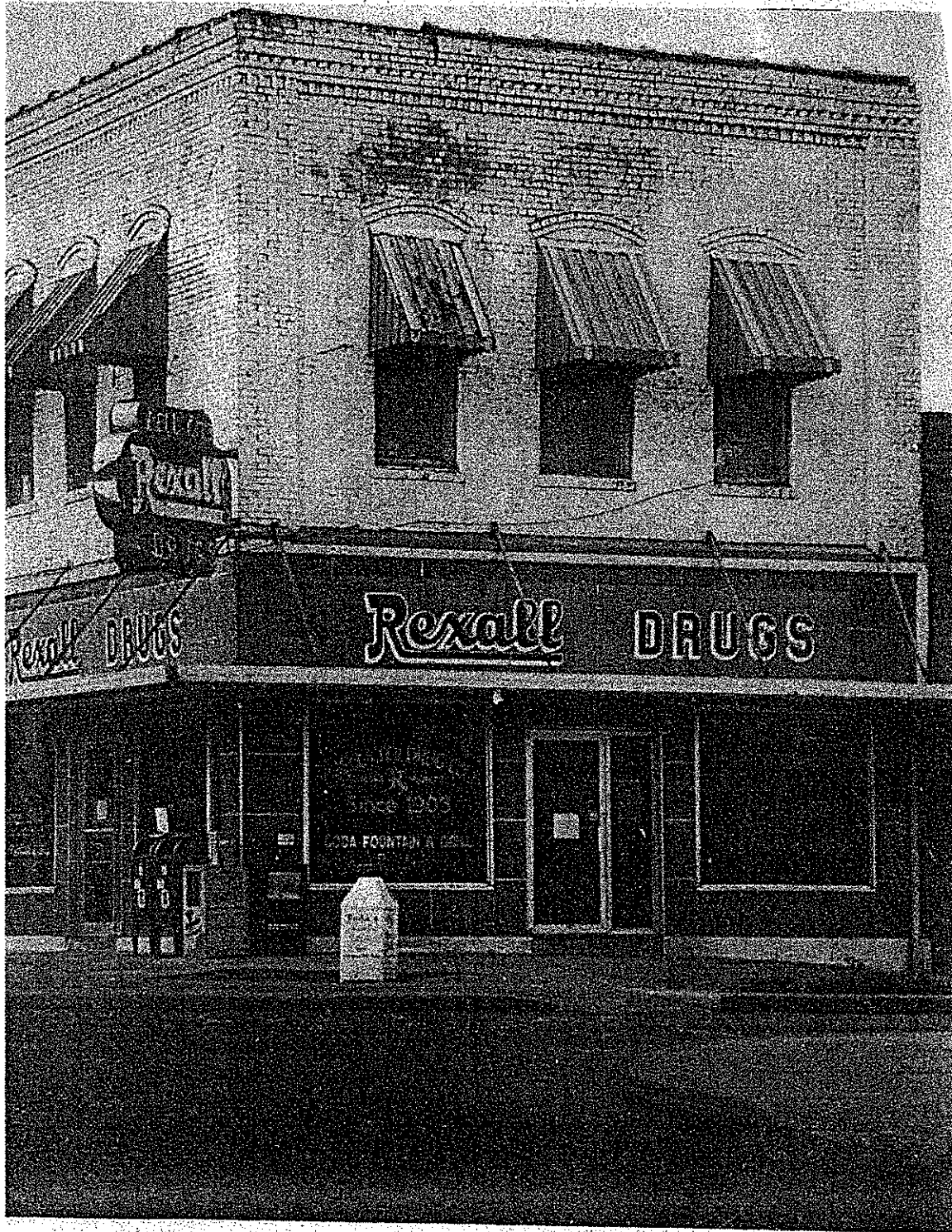
Individual sketches of the old

Winners will be notified, and pictures delivered upon receipt of the bid price by the commission. All bids remain absolutely confidential until official opening and announcement is made.

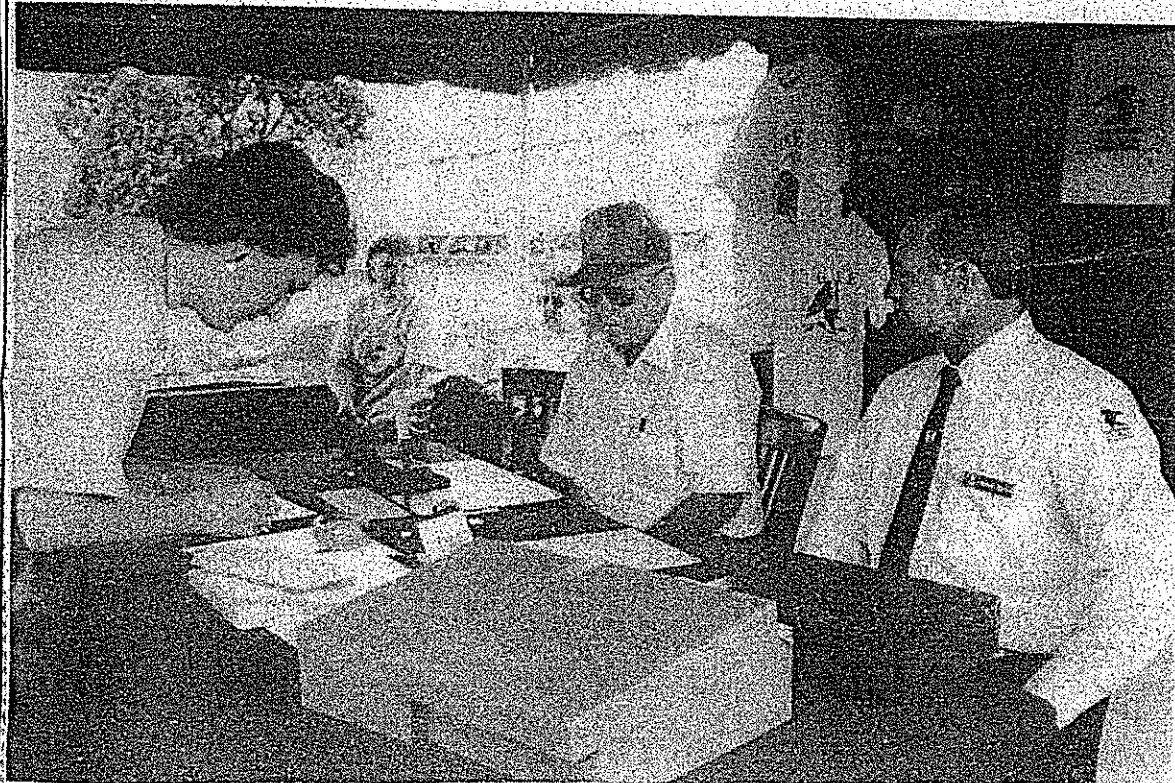
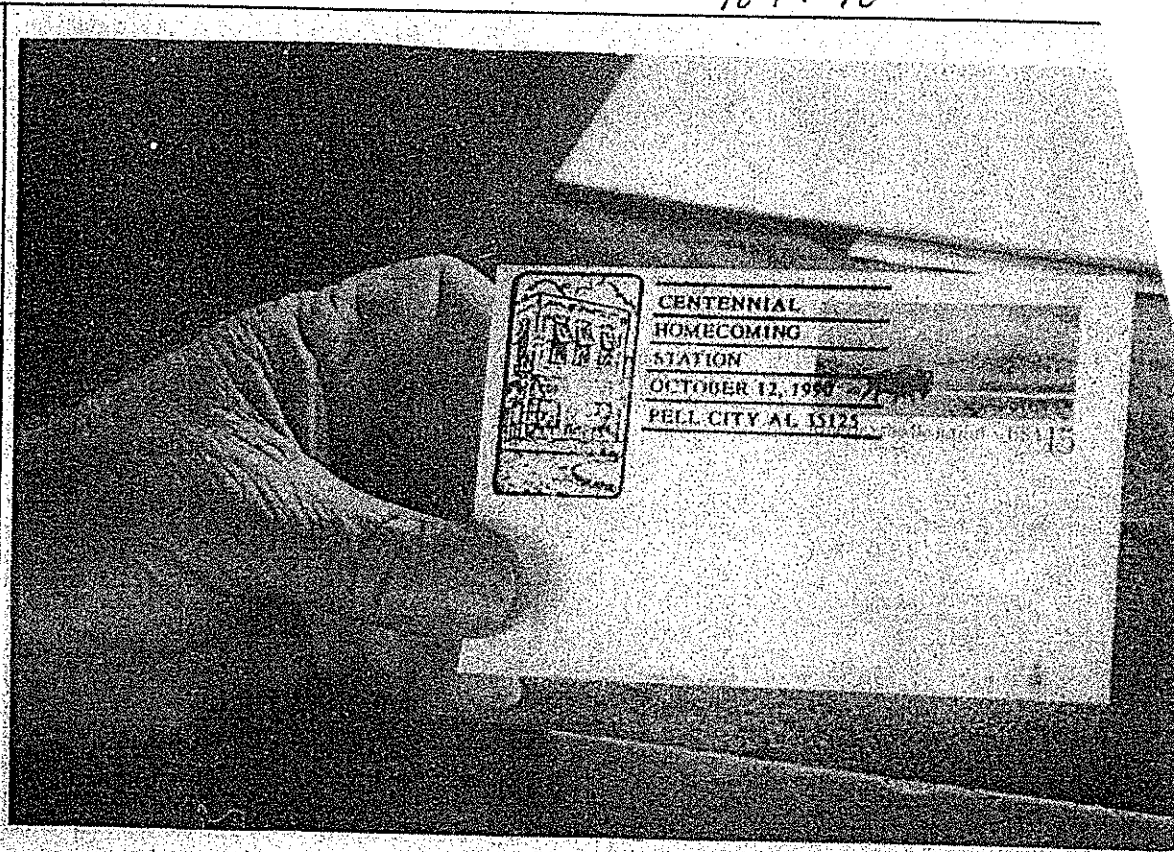

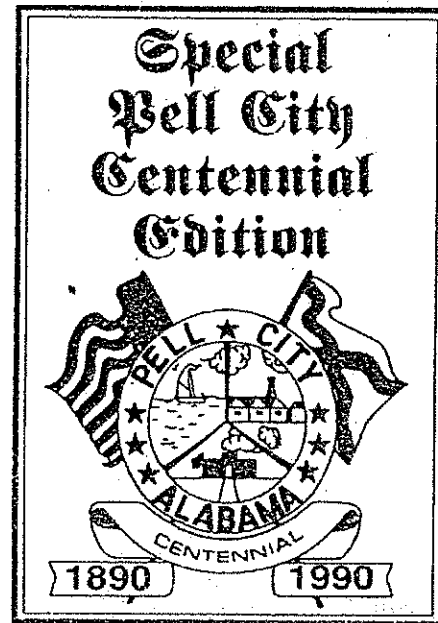
active in the Centennial and is now spearheading the group planning to restore the old fountain near the Mill entrance on Comer Ave.

As one lady said, "We should do this more often, it felt like old times."

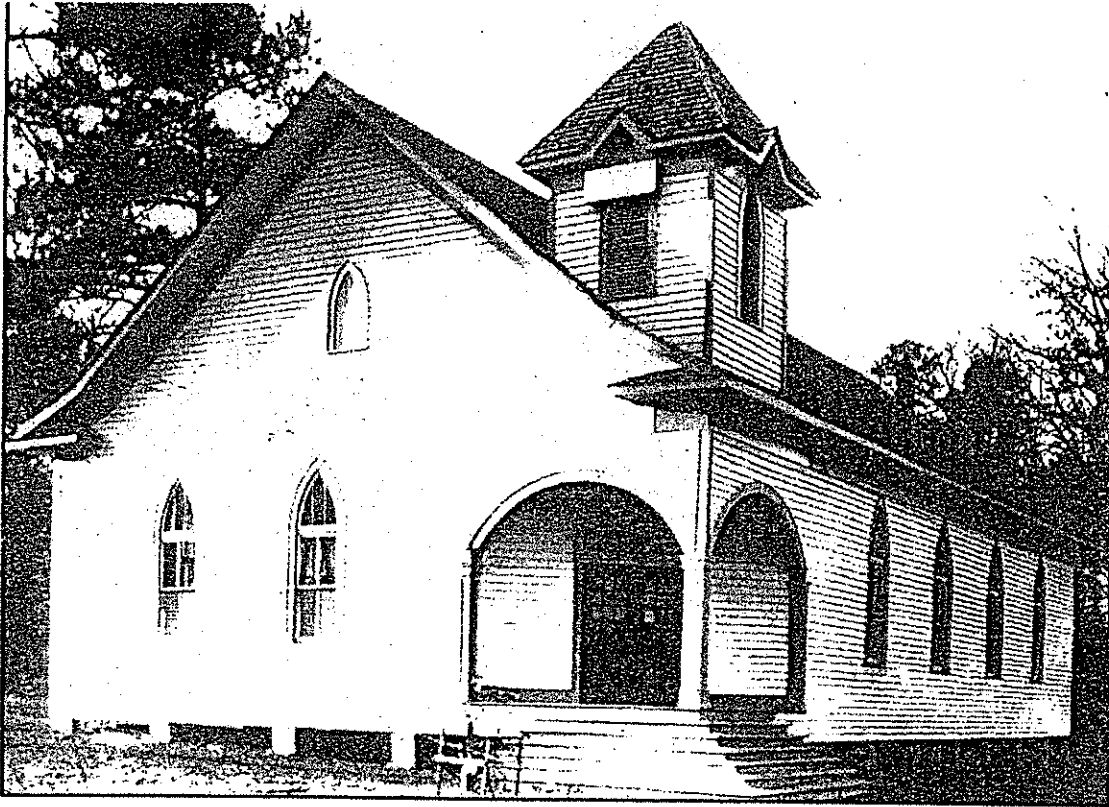

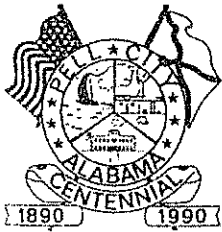

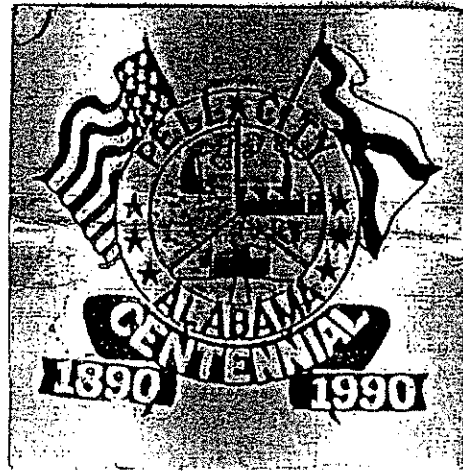

The Pell City Centennial Commission plans to seal this Time Capsule at a special Centennial Ceremony.

In that we realize that the last decade of this century ushers in the year 2000 A.D., the capsule would be sealed in 1990 and opened in 2000 A.D.

There are several reasons why a 10 year capsule would be historically revealing to the committee and the citizens of Pell City namely:

1. The city has unveiled its greatest growth plans.
2. Hopefully many of the Centennial Commission members and all citizens or their heirs (every component part of Pell City) participating in the sealing of the Time Capsule would be living and able to celebrate the opening of the capsule in 2000.
3. To challenge all constituent parts of our city to place their reports in the capsule namely: Governmental, Religious, Educational, Professionals, Enterprises, Banking, Industrial, Commercial, Social - Civic organizations, Chamber of Commerce and individuals if indicated.
4. Especially the school children who completed the 2nd grade in the 1989-90 school year because they will be candidates for High School Graduation in the year 2000. They are now 3rd graders, therefore, their 3rd grade teachers would have to assist them prepare their reports.

And the school children who completed the 6th grade in the 1989-90 school year because they will be candidates for a 4 year college degree. They are now 7th graders, therefore, their 7th grade teachers would have to assist them prepare their reports.

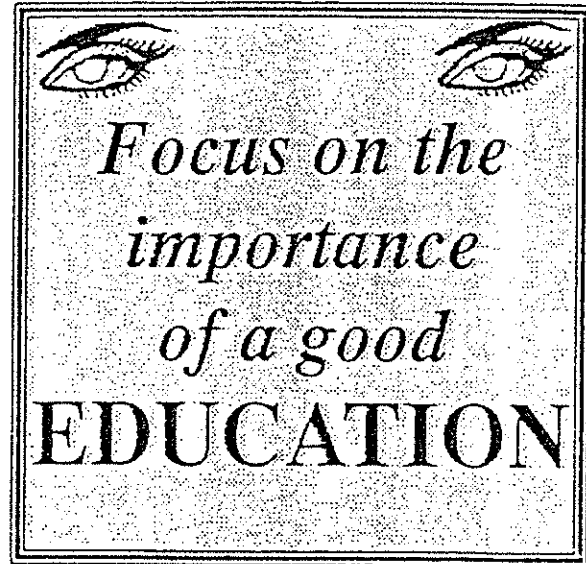
I have attended Pell City Public Schools since Kindergarten. I enjoy all subjects and make good grades but science and math are my favorite areas of study.

"If you could have but one generation of properly born, trained, educated and happy children, a thousand other problems of government would vanish" These words were scounded by President Hoover over fifty years ago, and reiterated to those in attendance at last week's AEA convention in Birmingham, by National Education Association President Keith Geiger.

Teachers, administrators and other education leaders met at the annual convention with the evaluation of our present education system in Alabama as one of the foremost thoughts in mind. Is it effective? What can we do to improve it"

Mr. Geiger addressed the delegates as to problems our system faces but focused mainly on six goals, adopted at an "education summit" of national Governors. The six goals, which have a target date of the year 2,000, have been endorsed by President Bush.

1. All students will start school ready to learn.
2. 90% of students will graduate from high school.
3. Tough and substantive curriculum will be set in every school.
4. Drastic improvements must be made in the areas of math and science.
5. All adults will be literate
6. School will be free of drugs and violence

As Mr. Geiger pointed out, if these goals are to be reached within the next ten years, schools must

begin immediately implementing plans which will achieve that success.

On the closing day of the Convention, AEA Executive Secretary Paul Hubbert, who recently announced his intentions to seek the office of Governor, addressed the members concerning problems being faced in our education system.

Pledging to be "an education governor" Hubbert sited problems which are being faced daily by teachers across Alabama. "... a third grade teacher will go back into a classroom with 33 or more students and present a concept in mathematics that will be grasped by only 25 of the students."

"With pressure from student testing, the basis on which the teacher is evaluated, the teacher will move on with the 25 and leave the other eight behind. In many other states, the class would be divided into two groups, and each teacher would have more time for all the students."

"You'll find those eight will later reappear in society, not as students, but as dropouts who will populate our prisons, who will make up our welfare roles, who will parent families that are so poor they cannot afford health insurance; therefore they add to the cost of indigent health care" Hubbert went on to say.

Hubbert suggested that one way to deal with the

problems of slow learners was to implement some type of tutoring program, in which retired teachers, college students, regular teacher or even bright high school students could work with these students to encourage and enhance their learning capabilities.

On addressing the problem of school dropouts, Hubbert felt that a vital area to help in combating the problem was to get the parents involved in their children's education. Realizing that this concept is often troubled by the fact that many parents are, themselves, uneducated and unable to help their children. Hubbert related that in some states, private businesses have started programs in which workers were encouraged to expand their education boundaries. The employers aid in this by letting them off early to attend classes and some cases holding classes at the business.

On a local level, a look at the goals within the Pell City School System would show a close relationship to the goals set out at the governor's summit and those held in priority by AEA Executive Secretary Paul Hubbert.

At the beginning of this current school year Pell City School System Superintendent Dr. Hoyt Washington set as a priority for the school system to add to the number of computers available throughout the schools. To reach this goal, Dr. Washington called on area businesses for their help.

The computer project called for \$30,000. \$10,000 of which was made available from the school system and another \$10,000 matched by the State of Alabama, leaving another \$10,000 needed to complete the project. Local businesses and individuals rose to the occasion and raised the needed funds. Recently seventeen new computers and five printers were installed at Pell City High School.

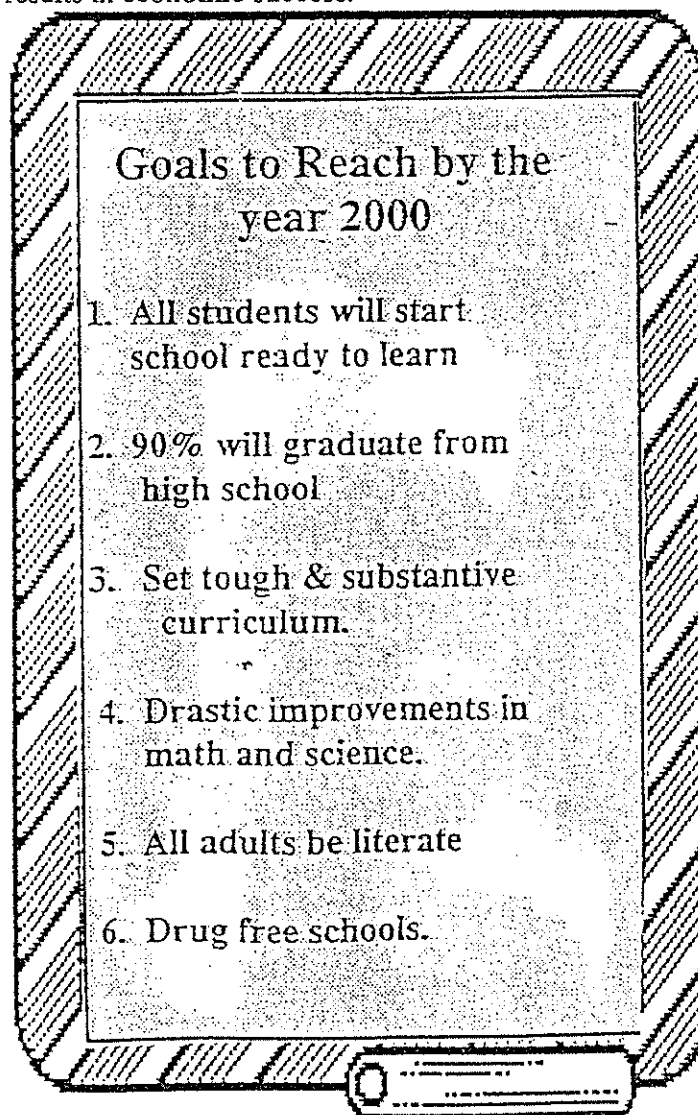
A priority for Andrew Wright, Principal of Iola Roberts Elementary, as related to parents at a PTO meeting held at the beginning of the school year was to work toward maintaining a high level of education standards. In the past few years, elementary students from the Pell City School System had scored well above the national average on standardized test such as the SAT. To maintain

this high educational achievement, Iola Roberts begin implementing the VIP Program. This is a program designed to enlist the help of retired teachers, parents and other interested parties to engage in one-on-one tutoring with students who need the extra help.

Recently, employees of Contel set up a program to talk with students in the ninth grade. The program, called "Choices" deals with the importance of a good education and hopes to instill in the students a desire to finish their education.

"...of all the resources that God gave us, we ourselves - the people - are the great resource. The key to unleashing that "people" resource is education." Hubbert said.

"Education translates into productivity, which results in economic success."

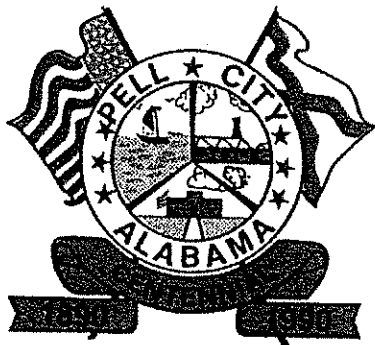

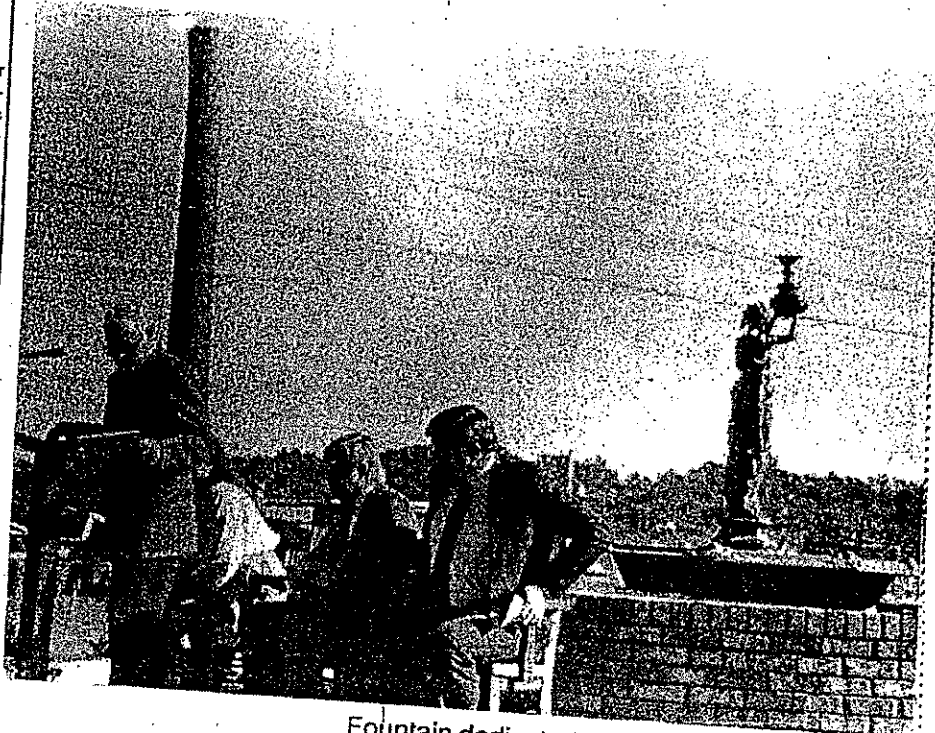

Pell City Centennial Commission dedicates Avondale Mills Fountain



Fountain dedicated

With Avondale Mills as a backdrop, the Pell City Centennial Committee officially dedicated the new fountain and park just off Old Coal City Road. Centennial chairman Hugh Williamson made the presentation and introduced Pell City Mayor Lawrence Fields who also spoke to the crowd. With them are Guin Robinson, fountain chairman and Susie LaFollette. The fountain, behind the speakers, is very similar to the original.

PELL CITY - As part of the continuing centennial program, the Avondale fountain and park were dedicated Sunday in ceremonies here.

According to information gathered by the centennial committee, the fountain had its beginnings in 1903 when Mr. Cogswell and a group of investors opened the Pell City Manufacturing Company, later to become Avondale Mills.

Their idea was to develop a city around the mill and to construct a village of "elegant and well built" homes for the workers. As part of a beautification program, several triangular shaped parks were laid out along what was then called the "Old Coal City Road."

dale employees, kept the "fish pond" but had to trash the iron lady.

Sixty years later, Mrs. Elizabeth Cogswell Starnes, daughter of founder Cogswell, remembered the fountain the reminded the centennial commission of the lost beauty.

The commission went to work on the project and received the 800 pound bowl from Bill Purdy who received it from his mother. He donated the bowl in her memory.

Commission member and fountain chairman Guin Robinson ob-

tained a close replacement lady from the Robinson Iron Company in Alexander City, who also made the original. The statue is an exact copy of one now in the Metropolitan Museum of Art in New York.

Sunday, commission members along with Pell City Mayor Lawrence Fields and interested residents turned out to dedicate the new fountain and park. Centennial chairman Hugh Williamson welcome everyone and officially presented the fountain and park.

Pell City history to be preserved in time capsule

A person can see the contents of their safety deposit box at any time, but one box at St. Clair Federal Savings and Loan will be sealed and unopened until the year 2000.

Security box 1009 will be used as a time capsule to store artifacts and important papers from today. The

Pell City Centennial Commission came up with the idea so a number of people beginning the next decade can relive the history of 10 years ago.

"We (the Centennial Commission) talked about a 100-year capsule," said Frances Hammett, co-chairwoman of the Centennial Commission, "but we decided to do

a 10-year capsule because we're beginning a new millennium."

Several reasons were mentioned why a 10-year capsule will be historically revealing to the Commission and Pell City citizens, Ms. Hammett said.

"One, the city has unveiled its greatest growth plans now than at any time in the past 100 years.

Secondly," she said, "many of the Centennial Commission members and all citizens or their heirs participating in the sealing of the time capsule will be living and able to celebrate the opening of the capsule in the year 2000."

muller over a number of ideas of what to place in the 10-inch by 10-inch by three-foot box before they voted to request documents from a number of governmental, religious, educational and professional entities. These various sectors were chosen so the next generation can see first-hand how things were done in the past.

Out of these various entities, the educational sector was targeted the hardest by the Commission.

Packets were developed by the Commission and distributed to all of the Pell City schools that had children in the second and sixth grades last year. These children were singled out for an important reason.

"The children that finished the second grade in 1989-90 and are in the third grade now will be candidates for high school graduation in the year 2000," Ms. Hammett said. "The children who were sixth graders in 1989-90 will graduate

from college in the year 2000. This is why we focused on them."

Each child will be given the opportunity to write an autobiographical sketch about themselves as they are today and what their goals are in the future. The child's teacher is also asked to give a few facts about themselves as a teacher and a cover sheet will have the name and address of the school, name of the principal and the date. The students will also be asked to sign their name on the back of the cover sheet. "Just like the Declaration of Independence," Ms. Hammett said.

After they are finished (the reports should be in the hands of Hugh Williamson by Nov. 15), all of the reports will be placed in a large envelope and stored at the Pell City Public Library until a ceremony dedicating the time capsule will be held.

"We are going to try and do a follow-up when the capsule is open," said Ms. Hammett. "Even if the student has moved away, we hope they will let us know when and where they graduated. We also hope college graduates will keep in touch and businesses that may no longer exist."

Ms. Hammett said the Commission plans to place the contents of the capsule and the follow-up sketches in the city's archives.

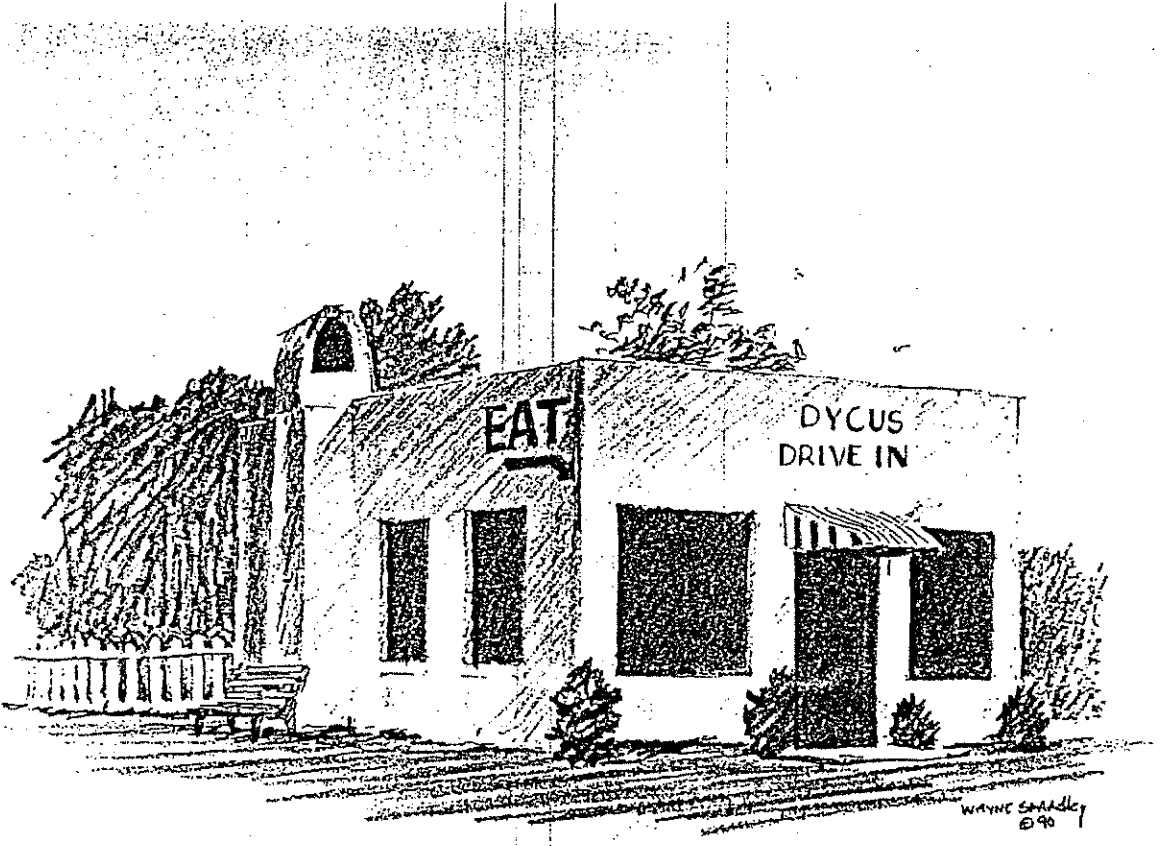
Centennial paintings

At the present time, we are in the process of a silent auction featuring Pell City landmarks drawn by our own world famous artist, Wayne Spradley.

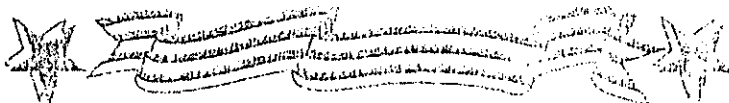

6. To create a small permanent college environment in the city

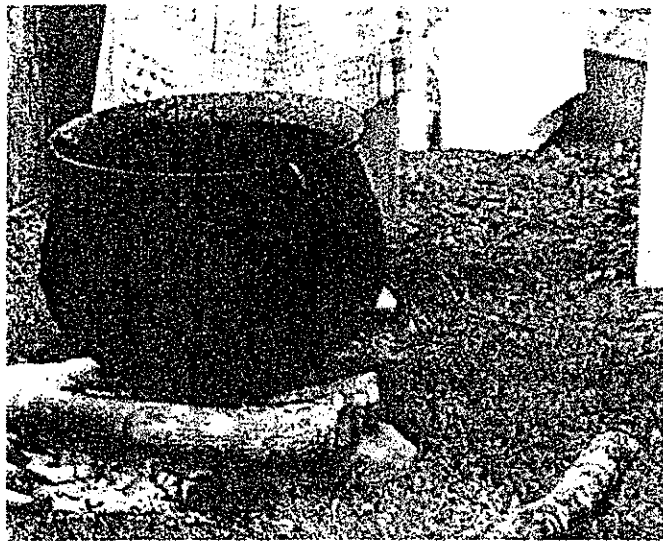

loan scandals the FDIC has found itself facing a financial shortage because of the vast drain of paying off people and businesses who had money deposited in failing S&Ls. The insurance fund fell almost \$8 billion since 1987.

Beginning next year, local banks must pay 19.5 cents to the FDIC for every \$100 on deposit in the bank. They are now paying 12 cents per \$100.

Many analysts believe that banks will soon begin passing the higher costs on to their customers in the way of higher fees for checking accounts, bounced checks and other services or lower the interest they pay on savings. Banks not passing the extra costs along may have to absorb them, thereby affecting their own earnings. For an already

Mr. HARRIS. Mr. Speaker, a centennial is always a historic occasion, whether for an individual, an institution, or a community. Today I want to salute the community of Pell City, the county seat of St. Clair County, AL, which this year celebrates the 100th anniversary of its founding.

The development of this community over the past century parallels the changes of the century itself. Begun as an industrial community established by George H. Peil, its location was chosen to take advantage of the area's natural resources and its proximity to the junction of three railroad lines. Despite such advantages, the community suffered greatly in the cycle of economic boom and bust, and the fights over railroad regulation which dominated the close of the last century. In fact, the Pell City Iron & Land Co. went bankrupt, as did its successor. However, the citizens of this community did not lose their faith or optimism. And, indeed, for Pell City the third time was the charm. New investment expanded the city's industrial activity beyond the original mineral-based economy to include the South's

first soap plant and textile production. Sumter Cogswell, a banker, industrialist, and civic promoter, led the resurrection of the community at that time.

Government has also played a role in the development of Pell City. When we in this House consider the need to rebuild and expand our Nation's system of roads, highways, and bridges, we need to remember what a tremendous impact earlier transportation programs had on the lives of our citizens. Pell City was the beneficiary of an early highway project sponsored by Speaker Bankhead. This highway, now known as U.S. Highway 78, linked Pell City with Birmingham and Atlanta, providing an alternative to reliance on the railroads. The link to those two larger communities was further strengthened with the building of the Interstate Highway System and the location of Interstate 20 in close proximity to Pell City. The construction of a hydroelectric dam on the Coosa River, creating Lake Logan Martin, not only assured a reliable source of low-cost electric power, but also opened up a recreational area which has proven extremely popular, not only to the citizens of Pell City, but to those of the adjacent Birmingham metropolitan area. In fact, the combination of easy highway access and recreational opportunities have made the Pell City area one of the fastest-growing in Alabama.

The economic transformation of Pell City has reflected the changes in our Nation's economy. The old dependence on iron and pipe mills has given way to the production of telecommunications equipment by companies such as Contel. The local school system has a commitment to preparing its students to take their rightful place in this rapidly changing world. And the citizens of this community, as they look back over the trials and accomplishments of the past century, are both proud and hopeful. I salute them, Mr. Speaker, for their perseverance, their imagination, and the cooperation which has allowed them to work together for their common betterment. These are qualities which have served them well in the past and which will, no doubt, ensure their success in the future.

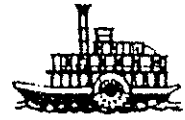
