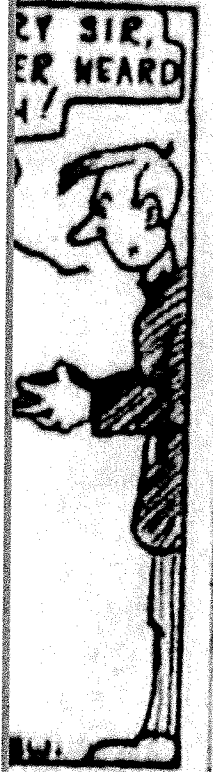

The College work was interrupted by four and one-half year's service in the Army. Upon completing the College work, he entered Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary, Fort Worth, Texas, where he received The Bachelor of Divinity and Master of Religious Education degrees. Mrs. Nutt (Bonnie Walker of Birmingham) is a graduate of Auburn and Southwestern Seminary's School of Religious Education. They have two children, Karen and Terry.

The new pastor states that he is pleased to find a great spirit and community pride in the Greater Pell City area, and a fine neighborliness in the Oak Ridge Village area where the Church is located. Mr. Nutt speaks optimistically of the future of Arbor Baptist Church and looks forward to growth of a great congregation. "Some few months ago I made a statement in this paper that 'I had resigned as pastor of the Comer Memorial Baptist Church not knowing just where we would go, but believing the Lord had a place of service for us.'

"That opportunity came within a few weeks through a call from the Arbor Baptist Church of Pell City, Alabama. Arbor Baptist Church in Pell City will celebrate its 100th anniversary next weekend with an arts and crafts festival and a special celebration.

Pastor Keith Ray said the church will hold the arts and crafts festival from 10 a.m. to 6 p.m. on Saturday and a 100th year celebration on Sunday, which will include a Sunday service, lunch and special entertainment in the afternoon.

He said the church will hold the arts and crafts festival in the field next to the church.

Ginny Bagwell, one of the organizers for the arts and crafts festival, said they expect 20 to 25 vendors.

"We could hit 30," she said. "We still have applications coming in."

Bagwell said there a variety of arts and crafts, including carving, wood working items, hand crafted jewelry, crochet, items to hang around the house and even some Christmas décor items.

Bagwell said there are things at the arts and crafts festival for children, as well.

"We will have a kid's zone," she said.

Activities for children include inflatables, a petting zoo and a couple of different children's games.

Ray said the church will also have food available at the arts and crafts festival, including hamburgers, hot dogs and soft drinks.

He said the church will donate the money raised from the arts and crafts festival to Samaritan's Purse's Operation Christmas Child, which provides Christmas items to children in impoverished counties.

On Sunday, there is a special service slated for 10 a.m.

He said there will be a lunch for members and former members of the church.

Ray said lunch was being catered so they already have a set amount of plates.

"We hated to do that, but we had to have a number," he said.

He said the public is invited to the Sunday service and the concert, which is scheduled to follow the Sunday's lunch under a big open tent in the field next to the church.

Ray said the concert, which will be held inside the church, will feature Rhonda Frye & Riverside of Chattanooga.

"We wanted to hold it inside because of the possibility of rain," he said. "Guests are welcome for the service and concert."

Ray, 43, was named the minister of **Arbor Baptist** Church in 2011.

He received an associate in science degree in business at Shelton State Community College, a bachelor of arts degree in Bible and Theology at Southeastern Bible College in 2002, and his master of divinity at the Beeson Divinity School at Samford University in Birmingham in 2006.

Ray and his wife of 14 years, Rebecca, have two sons, Jonathan, 6, and Samuel, 9 months.

Ray said he hopes next weekend's celebration and festival will help re-introduce the church to the community.
