Dear Dad -

We are still sailing the high seas, however I thought I

would get this written while I have the time, before the rush of getting settled and bouncing around to final assignment. Destination is still unknown though we have done some close figuring and have a darn good idea. After the first day out I got my sea leggs and have felt fine. The first day 'twas really rough, we were riding parallel to the swells.

I hope I didn't scare you with my request through the Red Cross, butthat was my only means of contacting the outside and hours were counting them. During my change of station some of my personal baggage was lost; some things that I was going to immediately need and some other things that I wouldn't be able to get later. I had no time to trace size it, and I still haven't gotten any satisfaction as to what dumb joe placed it in some other shipment. I hope that it will find me someday as it has some things that I can't replace. Red Cross were able to use their code number thus not revealing our location. Thanks a lot Dad. The addition, the fifty, was really helpful.

I will write you more when and what I can. You know my luck so don't worry about me. My only hope is that I will get a good, interesting, and active assignment. Just sitting around would really be hard to take out here. One thing that I don have in my mind that I would like to mention to you and only you. I may not come back; small as that chance may be. During the past two years, Pat and now my family have given me a happiness I have never before known. A happiness I guess we lost as a family Dad, bouncing around from appartment to appartment. I have onf often times wished that we had been closer as a family. It is surprising to recollect how little I have seen my own brother during my short but full 27 years. For the wonderful happiness of life that Pat has given me, I make a simple yet deep request. One that I have no doubt you would fulfill without my ever mentioning it. - Should I not make it back, give Pat and Mary Jacquelyn a helping hand during the time it will take for them to start living their own lives as they see fit. They have done a lot for this part of our family. Anything that I might have inherited, give to them.

On the other hand, I dream of celebrating, getting plastered, on two boittles of chilled champaigne at the Westchester Country Club. (Hmm guess I want a boy).

Well, Dad, keep things running at home, above all atks care of your own health! and it won't be too long before we will be having a real family reunion. The entire Brandli family together. That is really something to look forward to.



Dear Cousin:

I want to invite you to join the WELCH-WELSH-WALSH FAMILY ASSOCIATION. This is not a single-family group, but one where we are collecting and inter-changing information on all of the WWW families.

You know in your searching, you have come up with a lot of information which does not tie in with your family, but could be the key someone else is looking for. By the same token, they may have some new information on your family. If all of us work together we can do a wonderful job in helping ourselves and helping others too.

If you want to join and help, I am ready to work. The membership fee is \$3.00 a year and this goes to printing the bulletin which we put out twice a year. Your \$3.00 covers the cost of printing about a half-page in the bulletin. The more members, the more information we can publish.

Another point that comes up and I think should be explained now -- is that I do not make a dime out of this. The previous editor explained to me that it cost her about \$500 a year out of her own pocket plus hundreds of hours in work in getting the Magazine ready and mailing it -- if you are interested, I do not mind the work and a little cost, but this has to be as much your project as mine -- otherwise it will not work.

If you want to Join in, here is your assignment:

- Fill in the membership application and mail it to me. If you want to, complete the charts and mail in so you can be included in "Your Line".
- 2) Send me the names and addresses of the people who have written you about the Welch-Welsh-Walsh lines. (I want to send them a copy of the bulletin and this letter.)
- 3) Send me all of your Welch Information. I will copy it (photostat) and send it right back to you -- this is going to be the source of our information for future issues.

This will take you about an hour. Do it now, so that we can get to work on the Fall issue. Like I say, the more members - the more pages.

Dear Mrs. Welch,

Mr. C61lins sent me a copy of your very fine mss. with your check for the 1962 magazines.

I am returning the check since we are not at all sure that we will print another magazine. If we do we shall notify you.

In the meantime I shall send you whatever I find which may help you. My plan is to make master copies of such material affecting various lines, and when applicable to send Thermofax (yellow) copies. I do not have a Thermofax machine but take my work into the vilhage to be copied at ten cents per page.

If you receive such copies you may keep them and send me ten cents per page for replacements or you may copy them and return the yellow pages at no cost.

When I get time I shall copy some wills of the Dublin, Ireland, area which seem to tie in with your material.

In this way, I think, we may all carry on by private correspondence; and perhaps make greater progress.

One thing you can do, and should, if possible: write to The Public Record Office, Four Courts, Dublin. Send an initial fee of \$3.00, a copy of those Castlelyons Parish records, a copy of your family group sheets of the immigrants to New England, and no more at that time. Simply ask them to expand the Irish records with whatever they can find.

They will reply, then you may send a copy of the mss. and additional material as indicated. The point I am trying to make here is that it is better not to send too much — just essentials to help them locate your records in Ireland. Too much material would only confuse them; and all you wish to do is//d//shdd//is emphasize names, dates, locations in Cork, and the names, dates, of the immigrants to New England. It is most convenient for a searcher to be provided simply with Family Group sheets like the englosed sample of the immigrants. But be sure and send a copy of the Cætledyons Parish records, which as I remember, were all on one sheet.

Let me know what you hear. You should know that most of the Welches in New England were descended from Irish immigrants; so you might find that some of your relatives were already in New England when your group arrived. If you could locate them in the immigration \(\psi \delta / t / \) records you might be able to find their deeds, etc., and add much to your family history in that way.

Dear Mrs. Welch.

I had sent the check off in the wrong envelope. Eventually it came back; so now I am sending it on to you. I see it is dated last October; so you must wonder about our business efficiency.

Carr Collins may have sent it on to me pretty soon after that; but with having an operation on my car and eight grandchildren to plan Christmas for! Also, it has taken me almost this long to decide whether I would tackle another year of Welch-Welsh-Walsh. My decision now is that if I should print more former members could then be notified. For the present I am returning all chesks for 1962.

I had no intention of presenting that chart I sent you as belonging to your family. It could be; but aside from the material in Walsh 1170-1690 about the Cork Co. family I think you are taking the only course of finding out more. When you do write back don't fail to tell the searcher what has been reported already so you wont have to pay for searching the same records twice. As I recall, the chart I sent you was of an English family. The name Maurice made me wonder about the connection, if any. The Irish use the same names over and over. But if there is a connection you may never be able to prove it.

Irish records are said simply not to exist through some of the years. There is a new book just coming out about research in Ireland, Margaret Dickson Falley's Irish and Scotch-Irish Ancestral Research. Watch for it at your nearest large library. It may help. She is supposed to know about research in those countries than almost anyone.

I suspect it might help to search Barry at the same time. Often families intermarry for two or three generations, and their records overlap and intertwine, throwing light on one another. The Census of 1659 shows a John Welsh and James Barry (consecutive on the list) and a few names explicit preceding them David Barry - Corke City in the suburbs, Shandon Parish. The Parish records may be preserved.

Also, the Barry family in more rement history of the area was more prominent than Welsh. Therefore ther might be printed genealogies of your Barry family if not of Welsh; though possibly of both families. There were not many families that came all at once to America either. Usually they were following relatives who had come over earlier. Thus, you might hope to find records on this side if you could spot those earlier immigrants.

I wish I could help you more. Believe me I shall always be interested in hearing how it came out.

If you could find some living cousins on the other side, you might uncover some private collections of family records. Even some of the nationally important manuscripts are still stored in private collections. All of the old castles had special rooms for their books, records, some of which were so old they were inscribed on scolls and sheep skin.

Read A Sword From Galway by Mayrant (light fiction, nothing important) but it gives some background about this record business.

Something most people don't know - Ireland was the the most literate country in Europe, and was so before the English could read and write. Their poetry predates Beowulf and stretches back 2000 years -- proven by some of these old manuscripts. Much is still stored in private libraries.

Anyhow I hope Falley will help us uncover families, and if anyone knows how she does.

Best of luck, and keep in touch with me.

So many Irish records have been destroyed that lesser families might well give up any effort to trace themselves; but both Barry and Welch families had ancient pedigrees that have been written up in the genealogies of Ireland. Thus, I think, the above address may turn up some additional material. If not, keep trying to find a reputable genealogist over there to help you on a private basis.

The above address is the first step; and probably will be the least expensive. Certainly the initial dec wont be too much.

You are so right to type things up, and I thought your manuscript was fine. I shall treasure my copy.

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THE AMAZING STRANGERS (Breathmach, Walsh, Welch)

When, in the early part of the fifth century, the invasion of the Aug. AND Sexon tribes brought about the end of the Roman domination of England, the old Celtic people of Britain were left to themselves, and, Romanized as they were, they became easy proy to the semi-barbarous invaders, who siezed their lands and possessions, and eventually

invadors, who siezed their lands and possessions, and eventually drove them into the mountainous region of South-west England which we know today as Wales. The people were called "Welsh", which signified "strangers, "Their own name for themselves was "Cymri" which denoted "comrades". These are the people who are supposed to have colonized Brittany in France, and who gave the lagends of King Arthur and the Knights of the Round Table to the world.

Eigland number later, around 1950, the Norman conquerors of England under William I found it to their advantage to enlist the support of the Welsh who were hostile to the Saxon Kingdom.

During the reign of Henry 11, a hundred and twenty years later, we find many of the nobles and Norman adventurers deeply impregnated with Welsh blood. Some had married members of the old Welsh Royal family, and at Pembroke, in South Wales the Normans were able to command a large number of Welsh fighting men. Then in 1171 came the first Norman invasion of Ireland.

Raymond le Gros, (Raymond the Fat), nephew of "Strongbow", brought with his army of invaders two "Noble" men of the name of Welsh. One was called Philip, and one David. From these men the family of Welsh in Ireland is believed to be descended.

At a Wavel encounter with the Dane's of Cork, Philip is reported to have rushed on board the enemy's ship, and killed Gilbert (or Giolla), son of Turgesius, who commanded the Danes. This persuaded the Danes to retire for the time being.

At a later date, when Strongbow and his forces were attempting to invade Limerick, David Welsh, nephew of Raymond le Gros, weam the River Shannon, and "by the goodness of his horse, overcame the danger caused by the strong current. Part of the army followed his example. The remainder finally located a ford and crossed over. The Normans secured a great victory. It is not strange, therefore, that during the reign of Menry 11's successor, John, we find among the principal persons receiving grants of land in Limerick those by the means of Welsh.

It took several hundred years to make these Welsh-Morman invaders deserving of the description, "more Irish than the Irish themselves," However, as Trish historians have reminded us time after time, "the conquerors, the Mormans, high-souled, and high-blooded, grew Irish at last from the scalp to the foot".

Firsts however, there were the marriages with the Gaelic families, the adoption of the Irish customs, and, very important, the use of the Gaelic language. The name of Welsh became Breathnach, which was the Gaelic word for stranger. Today we find the name in the following forms: Brancock, Brunnock, Dely, Welch, Walsh, Walshe, Welsh, Welshe. We discover this Clan in the countles of Kilkensy, Kildare, and Dublin, where the Walshes of Carrickmain were the lords of Cldcourt. In Limerick, Cork, Tipperary, and Waterford we find them by the hundreds where the Welches and Dalys have for centurise

been known as the "king's enemies. Abbe MacGeoghain in his History of Ireland records: - "Peter Walsh was a native of Moortown in the County of Kildare; being admitted to the order of Saint Francis, he studied at Louvain, where he became professor of theology. There are many of his works in English, concerning the affairs of his time. The first part of his prospectus of Ireland has been given, and printed in duodecimae, at London in 1682. In this he begins with the history of the country, to end it with the twelfth century, but though the recital of facts contained in it be sufficiently correct, still the want of order ---makes the reading of it irksome."

There was a Doctor Walsh, Bishop of Meath in 1554. Queen Elizaboth sent orders to Sussex to call a meeting of the Irish clergy to increase the Protestant religion through Ireland. After this meeting Dr. William Walsh was-, a native of Waterford, was particularly zealous in the Catholic Cause, and was arrested, deposed by Elizabeth's orders, and banished. He died in Complute, Spain, in 1577, where he was interred in a monastery of the Cistercian Order of which he was a Brother The Welshes and Walshes and Breathnachs were in the front ranks with Sarsfield at the saage of Limerick. They went An the fateful exodus with him overseas to enter the service of France in her wars against England. One Welch was honored with the title of Count by the King of France. Another Welch, an Irish merchant living at Nantes in 1742 or 1743 , took his own armed vessel of 18 guns, and conducted Prince Charles Edward (The Young Pretender) fro ty France to Moidart an Scotland, in an attempt to help the Stuart in his plans to secure the throne.

Thirty-five years later, when the Irish Brigade eagerly sent its men to fight the old enemy on the American Revolutionary battleground, the regiments of Dillem, and of Walsh which came here with Lafayette demanded the right to be the first of the French service to strike

Britain on American soil.

On March 4, 1807, in the British Barliament, a grant of fl3,000 instead of f8,000 was made to the Maynooth College where the Irish boys studied for the priesthood after the partial relaxing of the Penal Laws. This was not done through any feeling of liberality but as Lord Howick put it, for the purpose of connecting Irish Catholics with the English state. It was claimed necessary to promote domestic Catholic education, as an institution of great extent had been formed at Paris at the head of which was a Doctor Walsh-a person of considerable note, who was attempting to re-establish and enlarge Irish education in Paris, with A VIEW OF EXTENDING political influence in Ireland i

(Nego¢iations had been made during the 1798 Rising and also the Emmet Rising of 1803 to secure help from France in-ereer-to in Ireland's fight for freedom. This we note, takes place after the

failure of the Emmet Rising.

"In the latter end of Autumn 1806, --copies of a -- decree (were received in Ireland) signed Napoleon, Hugh B. Marat, Champagny, and Walsh, Administrateur General -uniting Irish Eclesiastical Establishment and the French Dominions under the general administration of the Reverend Dr. Walsh late Superion of the Irish College at Paris. Copies were sent to Ireland and England. At the same time Dr. Walsh invited the students at ST. Patrick's College at Lisbon to come to Paris. to continue their studies. However, the Maynooth group which met in Dublin disapproved of the move.

THE NEW STRANGERS (Wallace, Walce, Welsh, Etc.)

At this point it seems wise to return briefly to the thirteenth century, in order to explain certain data regarding the Welch mame in Scotland. In 1283 Edward 1 of England brought the Welch
mation to almost complete subjugation. The Welsh prince Llewelyn was
put to death in a most berbarous manner and his head exposed on
the tower of London. His heart was burned, and his limbs exposed on
the gates of Bristol, Northampton, York and Winchester. From now on,
the King of England's son would receive the title "Prince of Wales".
For some unknown reason, the first Welsh in England's records, was
Henri le Gayles (Norman for Henry Welsh) who became Mayor of London in 1298 - Just fifteen years after the tragedy of Wales. But befor
this time Welsh families had been colonizing southern Scotland. Here
the name was written Walce, Wallace, Welsh, Welshe, Walsh, Walch,
Walch.

In 1297 Wallace, a "gentleman of moderate fortune" in the Scottish lowlands led a rising against England. At first he was successful, winning several victories. However in 1384 the rising was crushed by the troops of Edward of England, and Wallace was executed at Tyburn, The Scottish Cause was taken up by Bruce the following year.

To continue with our date on the Welches of Scotland, Micol Welch was Abbot of Holywood in 1488. A Welch represented the Burg of Dumfri in 1472. There were Welch families at Coliston, Skarr, Cornlee, Collin, Burnfoot, Capel Gill, and in other places.

During the period of Calvin, end Know, some of these Welches in Scotland became followers of the "Descenter", or Presbyterian teach-

ing.

In 1608, after the flight of the Earls O'Neil and O'Donnell, the entire province of Ulster in Northern Ireland which had until that time largely escaped foreign plantation, was lost to its old Gaelic race. Whole and entire estates of the Irish owners were confiscated by England. The old race was driven into Donegal, or the southern counties, or across to Europe. Their lands were granted to groups of Protestants and "dassenters" from England and Scotland. The settlers were called "undertakers", i.e., they undertook to colonize here. Among these were a group of Welches from Scotland. They are listed as farmers, weavers, and ministers.

During the sixteen forties Rory O'More led a rising in a futile attempt to winm back Ulster to the Irish, but Owen Roe O'Neil, the truly great, capable General to whom Ireland could look for leader-

ship died, and Ireland was steamrolled by Cromwell.

Then came the Penal Laws and "Dissenters" as well as Catholics were

persecuted.

The wave of emigration of these Dissenter groups seems to have been large between 1682 and 1684. By 1730 and up to 1750, 12,000 a year came to America.

younger.



"To me, playing golf to gamble isn't my idea of gambling. Buying a house or property that will produce for you - now, that's gambling."


And it is also challenging to Mrs. Smith for she has spent a great part of her life buying and selling houses and land.



Your request for the appearance of the 604th Air Force Band on 24 August 1968, has been forwarded, approved, by the Secretary of the Air Force, Office of Information.

In planning this participation, it is necessary to coordinate on transportation, per diem and meals. To that end, the following are proposed handlings of these subjects.

Transportation - Your organization arrange for a commercial bus, round trip, from Maxwell AFB, Montgomery, Alabama. Timing should permit the band to arrive at the site of the appearance no later than one hour prior to the start of the program.

Per Diem - Standard Air Force rates for personnel participating in civilian sponsored affairs such as your air show is \$16.00 per man per day. This reimbursement covers meals and housing costs which might be incurred as a result of participation in the engagement. The band usually numbers 40 to 45 personnel.

Dear Mr. Brandli:

Thank you very much for your letter of March 10, 1976, advising us of your intention to include the Austen Riggs Center in your will. As you can imagine, this is good news for any institution such as the Center which has a very limited endowment. We are in the process of establishing the Erik Erikson Research Fund which is designed to expand our research capabilities in the broad area of emotional illnesses. Your bequest could quite naturally be applied to this Fund.

We have no set form for the wording of bequests, and I would suggest that whoever draws your will can use the standard wording for making bequests to institutions. He would want to know that we are tax exempt under the Internal Revenue Code 501(c)(3) regulation. A copy of the letter attesting to this is enclosed.

We have noted your correct address and have changed our records accordingly.

I personally know Dr. Seton, although he left here before I joined the staff. As you may know, I came to the Center in 1967, a year after the death of Dr. Robert Knight. We have continued our emphasis on the psychotherapy of emotional illnesses. Almost all of the patients who come here now have been treated elsewhere and come here as something of a "last resort." They are for the most part young--median age about twentyone--and they are badly in need of help. The great majority remain here for a year or more because of our emphasis on the development of a therapeutic relationship, a procedure requiring much time. Dr. Margaret Brenman, Dr. Joseph Chassell, Dr. Edgerton Howard, Dr. Stuart Miller, and Dr. Ess A. White, Jr., continue to be on the staff. Professor Erikson, who now spends the winters in California, continues to serve on the Board of Trustees and to act as a consultant in research.

Once again, we are very pleased to learn of your continuing interest in the Center and thank you very much for your wish to contribute further to our program.

It is the opinion of this office, based upon the evidence presented, that you are exempt from Federal income tax as an organization, described in section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1954, as it is shown that you are organized and operated exclusively for charitable and educational purposes.

Accordingly, you are not required to file income tax returns unless you change the character of your organization, the purposes for which you were organized, or your method of operation. Any such changes should be reported immediately to the District Director of Internal Revenue for your district in order that their effect upon your exempt status may be determined.

You are required, however, to file an information return, Form 990A, annually, with the District Director of Internal Revenue for your district so long as this exemption remains in effect. This form may be obtained from the District Director and is required to be filed on or before the fifteenth day of the fifth month following the close of your annual accounting period.

Contributions made to you are deductible by the donors in computing their taxable income in the manner and to the extent provided by section 170 of the 1954 Code.

Bequests, legacies, devises or transfers to or for your use are deductible in computing the value of the taxable estate of a decedent for Federal estate tax purposes in the manner and to the extent provided by sections 2055 and 2106 of the 1954 Code. Gifts of property to or for your use are deductible in computing taxable gifts for Federal gift tax purposes in the manner and to the extent provided by section 2522 of the 1954 Code.

No liability is incurred by you for the taxes imposed under the Federal Insurance Contributions Act (social security taxes) unless you have filed a waiver of exemption certificate in accordance with the applicable provisions of such Act. In the event

you desire social security coverage for your employees or have any questions relating to the filing of a waiver of exemption certificate you should take the matter up with your District Director of Internal Revenue.

Your attention is called to the provisions of section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1954 under which your exemption till be revoked if any substantial part of your activities consists of carrying on propaganda, or otherwise attempting, to influence legislation, or if you participate in, or intervene in (including the publishing or distributing of statements), any political carpaign on behalf of any cadidate for public office.

At its annual meeting on May 22, the Board of Trustees elected Dr. Robert Coles member of the Board of the Austen Riggs Center.

Robert Coles, whose special interest is field work in social psychiatry, is a Research Psychiatrist for the Harvard University Health Services.

Born on October 12, 1929, in Boston, Massachusetts, Dr. Coles received the A.B. from Harvard in 1950 and the M.D. degree from Columbia University College of Physicians and Surgeons in 1954. He served as intern

at the University of Chicago Clinics (1954-55), as psychiatric resident at the Massachusetts General Hospital (1955-56) and at McLean Hospital (1956-57), and as child psychiatric resident at the Judge Baker Guidance Center, Children's Hospital (1957-58).

In 1957-58 Dr. Coles served as staff member in charge of the girls' section, Children's Unit, Metropolitan State Hospital, and was on the staff of the alcoholism clinic, Massachusetts General Hospital. From 1955-58 he was a Teaching Fellow in Psychiatry, Harvard Medical School, and from 1958-60 he served in the USAF as chief of neuropsychiatric service and wards of Keesler Hospital, Biloxi, Mississippi.

In 1960-61 he was a child psychiatric fellow at the Judge Baker Guidance Center and in 1961 a psychiatric consultant at the Lancaster Industrial School for Cirls. From 1961-63 he served as research psychiatrist to the Southern Regional Council on "Psychiatric Aspects of Desegregation in the South" and since 1963 has served as Consultant to the Council. He has served as Consultant to the Appalachian Volunteers since 1965. Since 1965 he has been a member of the National Advisory Committee on Farm Labor and is presently a member of the National Sharecropper's Fund.

He is a member of the American Psychiatric Association, the Group for the Advancement of Psychiatry, and Phi Beta Kappa. He is a contributing editor to THE NEW REPUBLIC, APERTURE, THE AMERICAN POETRY REVIEW and is a member of the editorial board of THE AMERICAN SCHOLAR.

Dr. Coles is the author of over 500 articles, reviews, and monographs written for periodicals, newspapers, and anthologies. Some 25 books include: CHILDREN OF CRISIS (in three volumes), ERIK H. ERIKSON: THE GROWTH OF HIS WORK, THE MIDDLE AMERICANS, A FAREWELL TO THE SOUTH, THE OLD ONES OF NEW MEXICO, and IRONY IN THE MIND'S LIFE. Five children's books include: DEAD END SCHOOL, SAVING FACE, and HEADSPARKS.

Awards that Dr. Coles has received include: the Ralph Waldo Emerson Prize of Phi Beta Kappa (1967), the Anisfield-Wolf Award in Race

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Relations of the Saturday Review (1968), the Hofheimer Award of the American Psychiatric Association (1968), and awards for Volume II and Volume III of CHILDREN OF CRISIS include: the McAlpin Medal of the National Association of Mental Health (1972), Weatherford Prize of Berea College and the Council of Southern Mountains (1973), Lillian Smith Award of the Southern Regional Council (1973), and the Pulitzer Prize (1973).







BRANDLI, to be Executor of this my Last Will and Testament, and in the event of my said husband's death, resignation, disqualification or failure for any cause to act as Executor, then I nominate and appoint my sons, JOHN DANNER BRANDLI or HENRY EDWARD BRANDLI, JR., in that order, to act as substitute or successor Executor.

EIGHTH: I hereby direct that no bond or undertaking or other security shall be required in any jurisdiction of my Executor acting hereunder, either by reason of non-residence in any State or District wherein my Will shall be required to be proved or for any other cause whatsoever.

MINTH: Without limitation of the powers conferred

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upon him by statute or general rules of law, my Executor is specifically authorized and empowered:

- (4) To manage, operate, repair, improve, mortgage, and lease for any term (whether longer or shorter than five years) any real estate at any time held by him;
- (5) To determine in his discretion whether the premium on any investment acquired at a premium shall be amostized from income;
- (6) Except to the extent prohibited by law, to cause to be registered in the name of his numinees, any accurities from time held by him or to retain any securities in such condition that they will pass by delivery;
- (7) To distribute in each or in kind, or partly in cash and partly in kind, upon any division of my estate; and
 - (8) In goneral, to exercise all powers in the management of my 4state which any individual could exercise in the management of similar property owned in his own right, abon such terms and conditions as to him may seem best, and to execute and deliver any and all instruments and to do all acts which he may does necessary or proper to carry out the purpose of this my Will.

- (1) To retain any property owned by me at the time of my death;
