Your name has been prominent in the conversations for all the years that I have been associated with the Brandli family. It seems odd that you would be the person for me to contact in requesting funds from the W. Alton Jones Foundation. However, I know that under your guidance it is well directed.

I notice in the sample grants the interest in education and, in several instances, in smaller schools, and I am encouraged to request an interview in order that I might explain the need of St. Bernard's College in Cullman, Alabama. St. Bernard's has approximately 500 students of all ethnic, religious and social backgrounds, of whom 45% receive financial aid. It is an independent private college and receives no direct church or government support.

We are still sailing the high seas, however I thought I would get this written while I have the time, before the rush of getting settled and bouncing around to final assignment. Destination is still unknown though we have done some close figuring and have a darn good idea. After the first day out I got my sea leggs and have felt fine. The first day 'twas really rough, we were riding parallel to the swells.

I hope I didn't scare you with my request through the Red Cross, but that was my only means of contacting the outside and hours were counting them. During my change of station some of my personal baggage was lost; some things that I was going to immediately need and some other things that I wouldn't be able to get later. I had no time to trace ~~the~~ it, and I still haven't gotten any satisfaction as to what dumb joe placed it in some other shipment. I hope that it will find me someday as it has some things that I can't replace. Red Cross were able to use their code number thus not revealing our location. Thanks a lot Dad. The addition, the fifty, was really helpful.

I will write you more when and what I can. You know my luck so don't worry about me. My only hope is that I will get a good, interesting, and active assignment. Just sitting around would really be hard to take out here. One thing that I do have in my mind that I would like to mention to you and only you. I may not come back; small as that chance may be. During the past two years, Pat and now my family have given me a happiness I have never before known. A happiness I guess we lost as a family Dad, bouncing around from apartment to apartment. I have ~~enaf~~ often times wished that we had been closer as a family. It is surprising to recollect how little I have seen my own brother during my short but full 27 years. For the wonderful happiness of life that Pat has given me, I make a simple yet deep request. One that I have no doubt you would fulfill without my ever mentioning it. - Should I not make it back, give Pat and Mary Jacquelyn a helping hand during the time it will take for them to start living their own lives as they see fit. They have done a lot for this part of our family. Anything that I might have inherited, give to them.

On the other hand, I dream of celebrating, getting plastered, on two bottles of chilled champagne at the Westchester Country Club. (Hmm guess I want a boy).

Well, Dad, keep things running at home, above all atke care of your own health! and it won't be too long before we will be having a real family reunion. The entire Brandli family together. That is really something to look forward to.

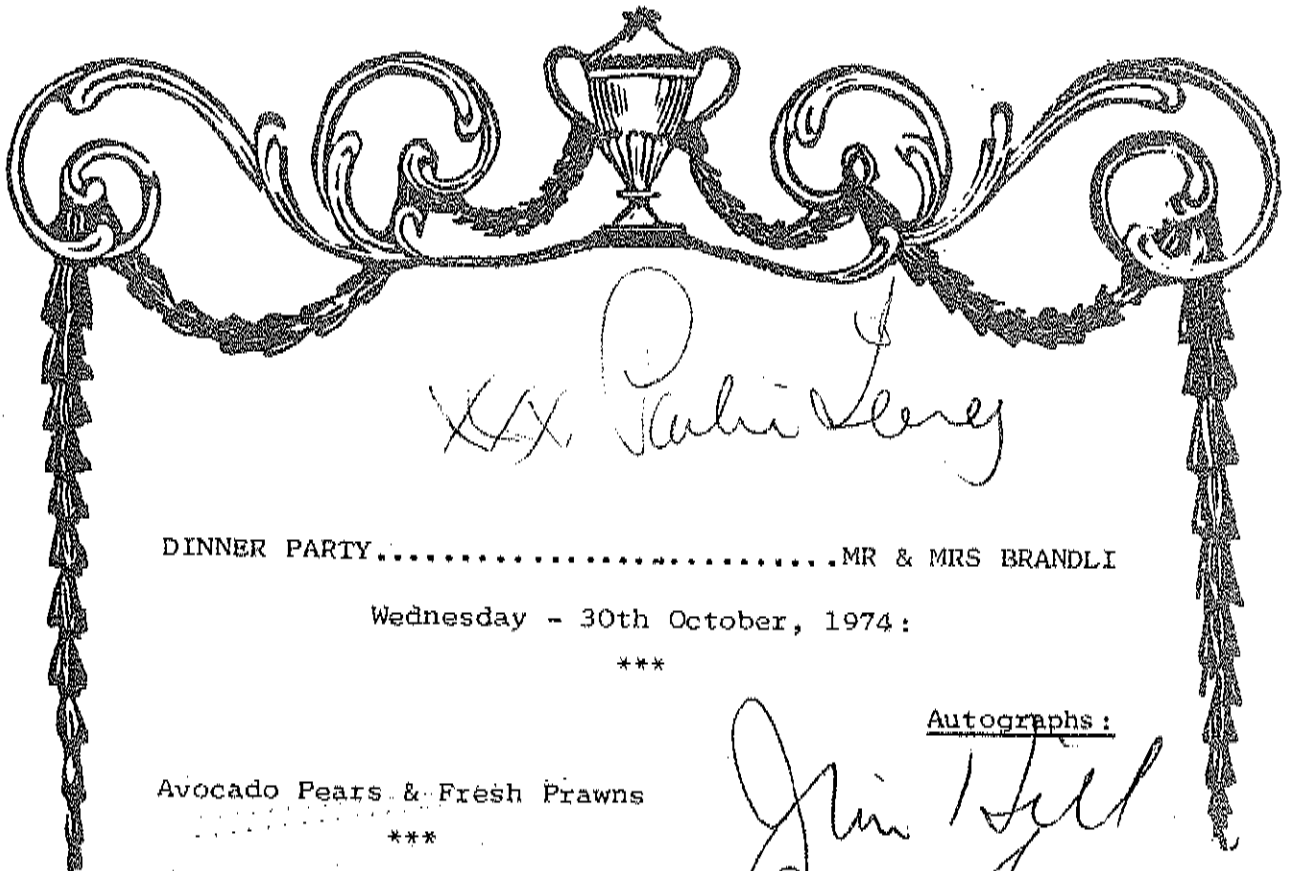
A pupil receiving F in any two subjects two reports in succession shall be dropped to a lower class.


If you want to join in, here is your assignment:

I do not have a Thermofax machine but take my work into the village to be copied at ten cents per page.

If you receive such copies you may keep them and send me ten cents per page for replacements or you may copy them and return the yellow pages at no cost.

When I get time I shall copy some wills of the Dublin, Ireland, area which seem to tie in with your material.

In this way, I think, we may all carry on by private correspondence; and perhaps make greater progress.

One thing you can do, and should, if possible: write to The Public Record Office, Four Courts, Dublin. Send an initial fee of \$3.00, a copy of those Castlelyons Parish records, a copy of your family group sheets of the immigrants to New England, and no more at that time. Simply ask them to expand the Irish records with whatever they can find.

I had done this but received word that the early Castlelyons records had been destroyed in 1922. W.F.W.

They will reply, then you may send a copy of the mss. and additional material as indicated. The point I am trying to make here is that it is better not to send too much - just essentials to help them locate your records in Ireland. Too much material would only confuse them; and all you wish to do is ~~to~~ ~~emphasize~~ emphasize names, dates, locations in Cork, and the names, dates, of the immigrants to New England. It is most convenient for a searcher to be provided simply with Family Group sheets like the enclosed sample of the immigrants. But be sure and send a copy of the Castlelyons Parish records, which as I remember, were all on one sheet.

Let me know what you hear. You should know that most of the Welches in New England were descended from Irish immigrants; so you might find that some of your relatives were already in New England when your group arrived. If you could locate them in the immigration ~~records~~ records you might be able to find their deeds, etc., and add much to your family history in that way.

Dear Mrs. Welch,

I had sent the check off in the wrong envelope. Eventually it came back; so now I am sending it on to you. I see it is dated last October; so you must wonder about our business efficiency.

Carr Collins may have sent it on to me pretty soon after that; but with having an operation on my ear and eight grandchildren to plan Christmas for! Also, it has taken me almost this long to decide whether I would tackle another year of Welch-Welsh-Walsh. My decision now is that if I should print more former members could then be notified. For the present I am returning all checks for 1962.

I had no intention of presenting that chart I sent you as belonging to your family. It could be; but aside from the material in Walsh 1170-1690 about the Cork Co. family I think you are taking the only course of finding out more. When you do write back don't fail to tell the searcher what has been reported already so you won't have to pay for searching the same records twice. As I recall, the chart I sent you was of an English family. The name Maurice made me wonder about the connection, if any. The Irish use the same names over and over. But if there is a connection you may never be able to prove it.

Irish records are said simply not to exist through some of the years. There is a new book just coming out about research in Ireland, Margaret Dickson Falley's Irish and Scotch-Irish Ancestral Research. Watch for it at your nearest large library. It may help. She is supposed to know about research in those countries than almost anyone.

I suspect it might help to search Barry at the same time. Often families intermarry for two or three generations, and their records overlap and intertwine, throwing light on one another. The Census of 1659 shows a John Welsh and James Barry (consecutive on the list) and a few names ~~earlier~~ preceding them David Barry - Corke City in the suburbs, Shandon Parish. The Parish records may be preserved.

Also, the Barry family in more recent history of the area was more prominent than Welsh. Therefore there might be printed genealogies of your Barry family if not of Welsh; though possibly of both families. There were not many families that came all at once to America either. Usually they were following relatives who had come over earlier. Thus, you might hope to find records on this side if you could spot those earlier immigrants.

I wish I could help you more. Believe me I shall always be interested in hearing how it came out.

If you could find some living cousins on the other side, you might uncover some private collections of family records. Even some of the nationally important manuscripts are still stored in private collections. All of the old castles had special rooms for their books, records, some of which were so old they were inscribed on scrolls and sheep skin.

Read A Sword From Galway by Mayrant (light fiction, nothing important) but it gives some background about this record business.



Anyhow I hope Falley will help us uncover families, and if anyone knows how she does.


The above address is the first step; and probably will be the least expensive. Certainly the initial fee wont be too much.

The papers I sent you before are some of them way off, as I had not the information necessary for more accurate data. You will find enclosed some money, and if this doesn't come to half the expenses, we will adjust it later. I can't make head or tail to the lists. I think Maurice (B. approx. 1790) who married Elizabeth Ring (Elizabeth Brien, Johanna Allen or Helen Ford) - was brother to James who married little proof of, that Jeremiah had a brother Thomas whose grave stone reads - "Thomas Welch Born Dec 22, 1830 Parish of Glanworth, Co. Cork, Ireland - died Feb 18, 1907 -"

To sum up, Margaret (Jeremiah's wife) would have been niece of Maurice + E. Ring and Edward, ^{Frank's grandfather} would ~~would~~ have been nephew to James + Ellen Ford. It would be wonderful if we could find the generation back of these people, in other words, Maurice and James' father + mother, but the Penal laws were making it impossible for any Church records to be kept publicly, and I'm afraid there just isn't any legal ^{or church} record. Until recently there was a branch of the Walsh family living at the homestead on Killavullen, Parish of Castlelyons, but they are gone now, though I think they are still in Ireland. Then, The Cashman lady told me Maurice husband of Mary Kelleher went back to Ireland twice + got the old home tax free (rent free is probably what she meant) and gave it to his cousin, as he (Maurice) was the only son - James + Helen Ford had.

Father James Corkery has been a great help to me. He is stationed at Castlelyons Parish Church, and is a water-color artist as a side line to his parish work. He searched all through available records at Fermoy, Corlagown, Conna, Castlelyons, etc., and found no marriage record of Jeremiah + Margaret, or Edward and Ellen Barry. The only one of these people whose marriage there was any record of was

moved to Norwich, and his descendants still live there I believe. I think your husband might remember his mother's cousin "Dave" as they called him. He married Mary Brewer and they had a girl May who would be in her later sixties now.

Now as regards this ^{other brother} Maurice Welch of New Haven who was so prominent in construction work, though it sounds impossible, it could be that he or the Maurice in Montville had another first name, and that one of them went by their middle name. The one in Montville sometimes spelled his name "Morris" and sometimes "Mauria". They were Gaelic speakers when they came out, though I presume they spoke English just as much. However in communities that are Gaelic speaking, and where names are repeated generation after generation, people are referred to as "Eamon Moss", i.e. Maurice's Edward, or "Sean Moss" i.e. Maurice's John. I have a close friend who lived in Cork years ago, and her name is Bessie, ~~or~~ Elizabeth, and her sister's was Mary Elizabeth. So those things do happen. The brother in New London by the same name was the oldest, and I find the three brothers each named their oldest son Maurice. I suppose the stone in Saint Lawrence Cemetery with the following is the Maurice in question. Would "Mary Kellerher" be a married sister?

For the last month I've wanted so much to get in touch with you and had let your more recent address get away from me, and I was even so glad to get your letter and know you are O.K. A while ago I got out the Walsh Pedigree data including a copy of the latest genealogical ^{report} received from Dublin (just before Condon Arthur and Frank died, and I've been figuring out how I could change some of what I'd written to be in line with some of the later facts that came up. All Frank's people have copies of what we did, but I want to get together something for the New London public Library and also for the Norwich Library (which has loads of genealogies of local people). Frank's branch of the family was more numerous in New London as all the descendants of his 2 great uncles remained there, and many on Eliza's branch. There isn't too much more example on Frank's branch, but your branch fascinates me because of Walsh marrying Walsh, and also because of the difficulty we had of establishing exactly where in Ferris they come from. You will find in the genealogical Research report we got from Dublin, under Ferris records:

1830, May 31 - Maurice of Maurice Walsh and Ellen Ford -
Sponsors, James Ford and Mary Ford "Barrack Hill"
and again,

1833, June 16, Honora, of Maurice Walsh and Ellen Ford -
Sponsors, Arthur O'Neil and Catherine Duire "Barrack Hill"

These are Margaret's (Jeremiah's wife's) brother, and the sister who married Mr. Cashman.

It would seem that either Margaret herself was the daughter of Maurice Walsh and Ellen Ford, or else that Ellen, or Helen Ford married James Walsh first, and Maurice Walsh later which seems unlikely. Margaret is not in this list as records in Ferris only go back to 1828, and Margaret was born in 1827

When I was talking to Grace Bolland and to Mrs. Kirk they told me that about 1930 Henry Ford had written some book - possibly a biography - and his genealogy was in it. One of the New Haven newspapers printed it, and there was mention made of the Walsh connection in it. We should really try to get a copy of this - it might help.

THE AMAZING STRANGERS
(Breathnach, Walsh, Welch)

When, in the early part of the fifth century, the invasion of the Anglo-Saxon tribes brought about the end of the Roman domination of England, the old Celtic people of Britain were left to themselves, and, Romanized as they were, they became easy prey to the semi-barbarous invaders, who siezed their lands and possessions, and eventually drove them into the mountainous region of South-west England which we know today as Wales. The people were called "Welsh", which signified "strangers", their own name for themselves was "Cymri", which denoted "comrades". These are the people who are supposed to have colonized Brittany in France, and who gave the legends of King Arthur and the Knights of the Round Table to the world.

Six hundred years later, around 1066, the Norman conquerors of England under William I found it to their advantage to enlist the support of the Welsh who were hostile to the Saxon Kingdom.

During the reign of Henry II, a hundred and twenty years later, we find many of the nobles and Norman adventurers deeply intermingled with Welsh blood. Some had married members of the old Welsh Royal family, and at Pembroke, in South Wales the Normans were able to command a large number of Welsh fighting men. Then in 1171 came the first Norman invasion of Ireland.

Raymond le Gros, (Raymond the Fat), nephew of "Strongbow", brought with his army of invaders two "Noble" men of the name of Welsh. One was called Philip, and one David. From these men the family of Welsh in Ireland is believed to be descended.

At a Naval encounter with the Danes of Cork, Philip is reported to have rushed on board the enemy's ship, and killed Gilbert (or Giolla), son of Turgesius, who commanded the Danes. This persuaded the Danes to retire for the time being.

At a later date, when Strongbow and his forces were attempting to invade Limerick, David Welsh, nephew of Raymond le Gros, swam the River Shannon, and "by the goodness of his horse, overcame the danger caused by the strong current. Part of the army followed his example. The remainder finally located a ford and crossed over. The Normans secured a great victory. It is not strange, therefore, that during the reign of Henry II's successor, John, we find among the principal persons receiving grants of land in Limerick those by the name of Welsh.

It took several hundred years to make these Welsh-Norman invaders deserving of the description, "more Irish than the Irish themselves." However, as Irish historians have reminded us time after time, "the conquerors, the Normans, high-souled, and high-blooded, grew Irish at last from the scalp to the foot".

Firstly however, there were the marriages with the Gaelic families, the adoption of the Irish customs, and, very important, the use of the Gaelic language. The name of Welsh became Breathnach, which was the Gaelic word for stranger. Today we find the name in the following forms :- Bramnock, Brunnock, Daly, Welch, Walsh, Walshe, Welsh, Welshe. We discover this Clan in the counties of Kilkenny, Kildare, and Dublin, where the Welshes of Carrickmain were the lords of Oldcourt. In Limerick, Cork, Tipperary, and Waterford we find them by the hundreds where the Welshes and Dalys have for centuries

been known as the "king's enemies. Abbe MacGeoghain in his History of Ireland records : - "Peter Walsh was a native of Moortown in the County of Kildare ; being admitted to the order of Saint Francis, he studied at Louvain, where he became professor of theology. There are many of his works in English, concerning the affairs of his time. The first part of his prospectus of Ireland has been given, and printed in duodecimae , at London in 1682. In this he begins with the history of the country, to end it with the twelfth century, but though the recital of facts contained in it be sufficiently correct, still the want of order ---makes the reading of it irksome."

There was a Doctor Walsh, Bishop of Meath in 1554. Queen Elizabeth sent orders to Sussex to call a meeting of the Irish clergy to increase the Protestant religion through Ireland. After this meeting Dr. William Walsh was--, a native of Waterford, was particularly zealous in the Catholic Cause, and was arrested, deposed by Elizabeth's orders, and banished. He died in Complute, Spain, in 1577, where he was interred in a monastery of the Cistercian Order of which he was a Brother. *The Welshes and Walshes and Breathnachs were in the front ranks with Sarsfield at the sâge of Limerick. They went on the fateful exodus with him overseas to enter the service of France in her wars against England. One Welch was honored with the title of Count by the King of France. Another Welch, an Irish merchant living at Nantes in 1742 or 1743 , took his own armed vessel of 18 guns, and conducted Prince Charles Edward (The Young Pretender) from France to Moldart in Scotland, in an attempt to help the Stuart in his plans to secure the throne.

Thirty-five years later, when the Irish Brigade eagerly sent its men to fight the old enemy on the American Revolutionary battleground, the regiments of Dillon, and of Walsh which came here with Lafayette demanded the right to be the first of the French service to strike Britain on American soil.

On March 4, 1807, in the British Parliament, a grant of £13,000 instead of £8,000 was made to the Maynooth College where the Irish boys studied for the priesthood after the partial relaxing of the Penal Laws. This was not done through any feeling of liberality but as Lord Howick put it, for the purpose of connecting Irish Catholics with the English state. It was claimed necessary to promote domestic Catholic education, as an institution of great extent had been formed at Paris at the head of which was a Doctor Walsh--a person of considerable note, who was attempting to re-establish and enlarge Irish education in Paris, with A VIEW OF EXTENDING political influence in Ireland !

(Negotiations had been made during the 1798 Rising and also the Emmet Rising of 1803 to secure help from France ~~in order to~~ in Ireland's fight for freedom. This we note, takes place after the failure of the Emmet Rising.

"In the latter end of Autumn 1806, --copies of a -- decree (were received in Ireland) signed Napoleon, Hugh B. Marat, Champagny, and Walsh, Administrateur General --uniting Irish Ecclesiastical Establishment in the French Dominions under the general administration of the Reverend Dr. Walsh late Superior of the Irish College at Paris. Copies were sent to Ireland and England. At the same time Dr. Walsh invited the students at St. Patrick's College at Lisbon to come to Paris, to continue their studies. However, the Maynooth group which met in Dublin disapproved of the move.

THE NEW STRANGERS
(Wallace, Walce, Welsh, Etc.)

At this point it seems wise to return briefly to the thirteenth century, in order to explain certain data regarding the Welch name in Scotland. In 1283 Edward I of England brought the Welsh nation to almost complete subjugation. The Welsh prince Llewelyn was put to death in a most barbarous manner and his head exposed on the tower of London. His heart was burned, and his limbs exposed on the gates of Bristol, Northampton, York and Winchester. From now on, the King of England's son would receive the title "Prince of Wales".

For some unknown reason, the first Welsh in England's records, was Henri le Gayles (Norman for Henry Welsh) who became Mayor of London in 1298 - just fifteen years after the tragedy of Wales. But before this time Welsh families had been colonizing southern Scotland. Here the name was written Walce, Wallace, Welsh, Welshe, Walsh, Walch, Welch.

In 1297 Wallace, a "gentleman of moderate fortune" in the Scottish lowlands led a rising against England. At first he was successful, winning several victories. However in 1304 the rising was crushed by the troops of Edward of England, and Wallace was executed at Tyburn. The Scottish Cause was taken up by Bruce the following year.

To continue with our data on the Welches of Scotland, Nicol Welch was Abbot of Holywood in 1488. A Welch represented the Burg of Dumfriesshire in 1472. There were Welch families at Coliston, Skarr, Cornice, Collin, Burnfoot, Capel Gill, and in other places.

During the period of Calvin, and Knox, some of these Welches in Scotland became followers of the "Dessenter", or Presbyterian teaching.

In 1608, after the flight of the Earls O'Neill and O'Donnell, the entire province of Ulster in Northern Ireland which had until that time largely escaped foreign plantation, was lost to its old Gaelic race. Whole and entire estates of the Irish owners were confiscated by England. The old race was driven into Donegal, or the southern counties, or across to Europe. Their lands were granted to groups of Protestants and "dissenters" from England and Scotland. The settlers were called "undertakers", i.e., they undertook to colonize here. Among these were a group of Welches from Scotland. They are listed as farmers, weavers, and ministers.

During the sixteen forties Rory O'More led a rising in a futile attempt to win back Ulster to the Irish, but Owen Roe O'Neill, the truly great, capable General to whom Ireland could look for leadership died, and Ireland was steamrolled by Cromwell.

Then came the Penal Laws and "Dissenters" as well as Catholics were persecuted.

The wave of emigration of these Dissenter groups seems to have been large between 1682 and 1684. By 1730 and up to 1750, 12,000 a year came to America.

They gave famine, high rents, and English laws and oppression as the chief reasons. Finally England broke Ulster's woolen and linen industries in the interests of her own people's manufacturing projects.

In 1638 or 1640 we find Thomas Welch in Milford, Conn. His descendants settled New Milford.

In 1654 Philip Welch, aged 16 was kidnapped by an English seaman and brought to America on board the ship "Goodfellow".



"To me, playing golf to gamble isn't my idea of gambling. Buying a house or property that will produce for you — now, that's gambling."

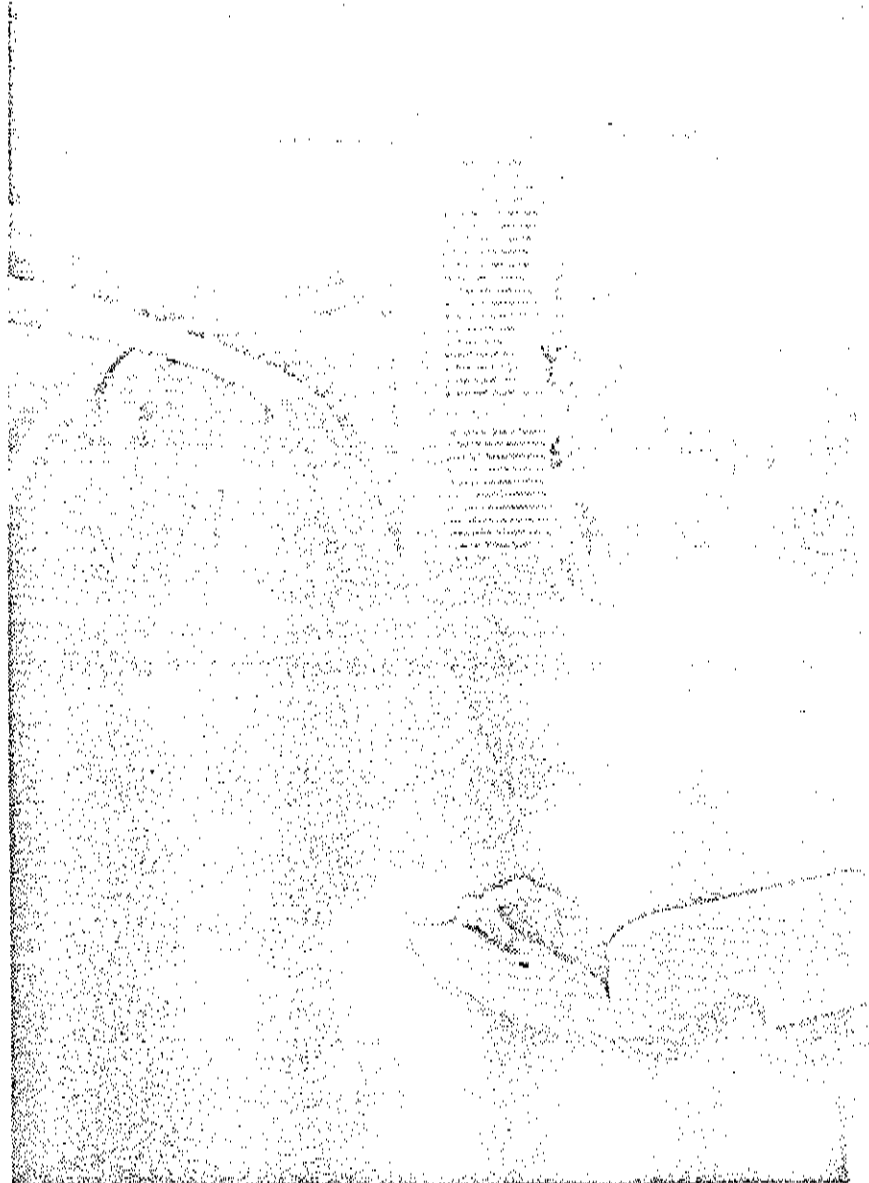
And it is also challenging to Mrs. Smith for she has spent a great part of her life buying and selling houses and land.

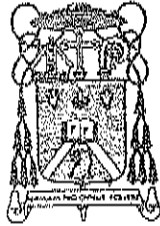
THE PETITE gray-haired college student has a great sense of humor and mentioned casually that one problem at school was that there weren't too many available fellows on campus her age.

Mapping The Life Of St. Patrick



March 17 is St. Patrick's Day. It commemorates the death—not the birth—of Ireland's patron saint, probably because authorities disagree on exactly when and even where he was born.

History has a way of draping legends about great figures and it is difficult, if not impossible, to be precise about many dates in St. Patrick's career. Authorities differ as much as 20 years on some.

And in no scholarly study is there any proof for the legend that St.

Patrick was sent to Ireland as a slave to an Irish chieftain near Mt. Slemish, close by the modern town of Ballymena. He is reported to have said as many as 100 prayers a day.

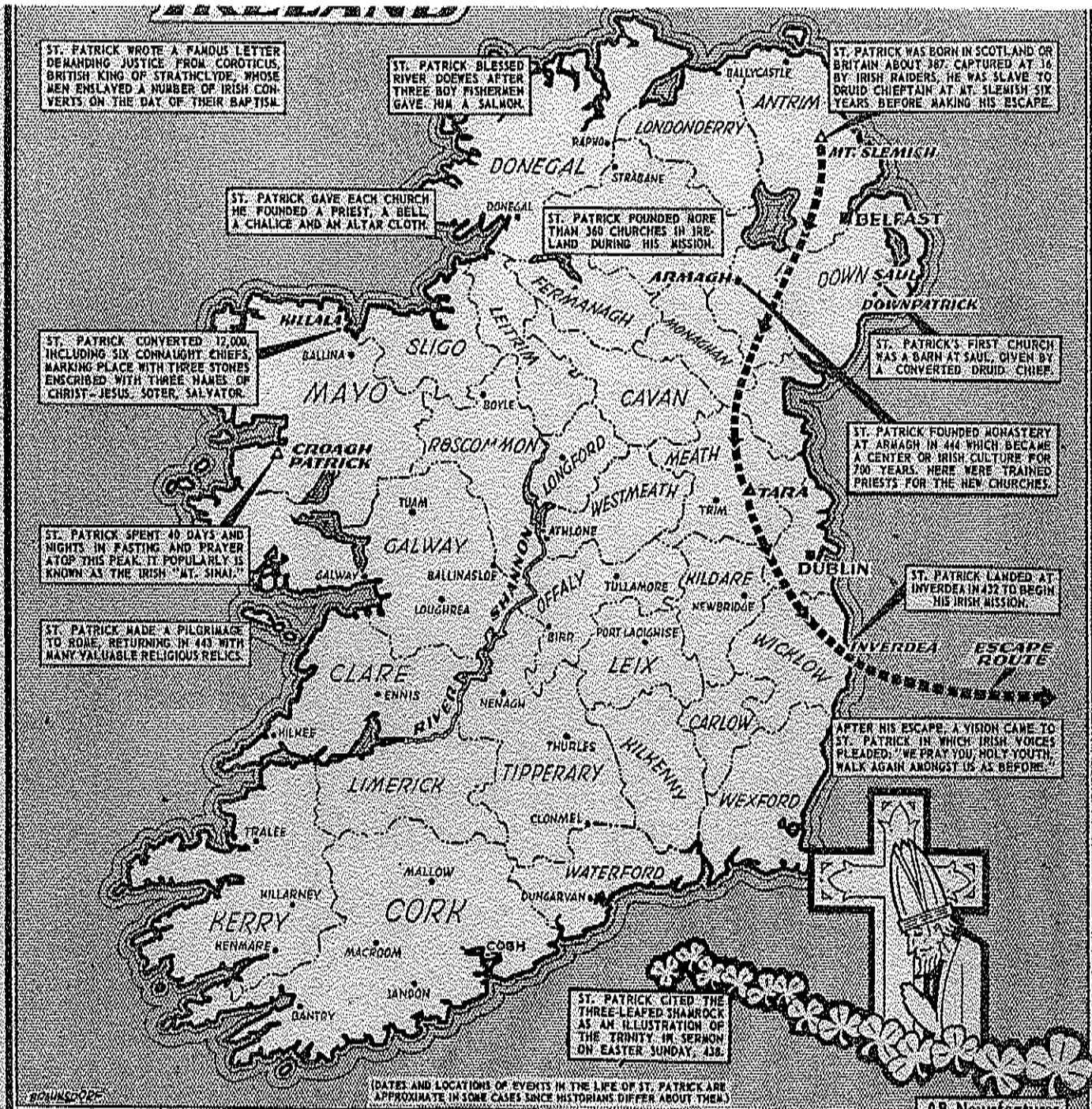
He escaped and fled to the coast of Wicklow where he boarded a ship carrying Irish wolf-hounds to what is now France. He studied for several years at the monastery of Lerins, then made his way back to Britain. Here it was he heard the call to return as a missionary to the land of his captivity,

longer in each place, preaching, baptizing and organizing a parish. He had many followers who traveled with him, learning to be priests and St. Patrick left them to staff the churches he founded.

In 444, St. Patrick established a church and monastery at Armagh which was to develop into the ecclesiastical capital of all Ireland. Here he trained clerics to take over the constantly expanding number of Irish churches. Here workshops for his gold, silver and bronze

many of the wells from which drank and on one occasion blessed the River Doewes after three boys fishing there gave him a salmon.

March 17 is St. Patrick's Day. It commemorates the death—not the birth—of Ireland's patron saint. It probably because authorities disagree on exactly when and even where he was born.

History has a way of draping legends about great figures and it is difficult, if not impossible, to be precise about many dates in St. Patrick's career. Authorities differ as much as 20 years on some.

And in no scholarly study is there any proof for the legend that St. Patrick drove the snakes out of Ireland.

St. Patrick was born in either Dumbarton, Scotland, or in Britain on the banks of the River Severn in either 387 or 389. Researchers will not even speculate on a particular day.

They agree, however, that he was the son of Calpornius, a middle-class land owner and minor official of the Roman empire. The boy was educated as a Christian but at 16 was captured by Irish raiders and sold into slavery.

ed sheep for an Irish chieftain near Mt. Slemish, close by the modern town of Ballymena. He is reported to have said as many as 100 prayers a day.

He escaped and fled to the coast of Wicklow where he boarded a ship carrying Irish wolf-hounds to what is now France. He studied for several years at the monastery of Lerins, then made his way back to Britain. Here it was he heard the call to return as a missionary to the land of his captivity. It was a vision in which, he said, the "voices of unborn children" beseeched him to come back to Ireland.

He returned to Ireland in 432, landing at Inverdea, at the mouth of the River Vartry. He celebrated his first mass in a barn at Saul, donated by a converted chief named Dichu.

St. Patrick won converts by the thousands. He established more than 360 churches principally in the north of Ireland and consecrated, in all, 350 bishops.

longer in each place, preaching, baptizing and organizing a parish. He had many followers who traveled with him learning to be priests and St. Patrick left them to staff the churches he founded.

In 444, St. Patrick established a church and monastery at Armagh which was to develop into the ecclesiastical capital of all Ireland. Here he trained clerics to take over the constantly expanding number of Irish churches. Here workshops for his gold, silver and bronze smiths, artificers and brewers.

Before he died, the school at Armagh attracted scholars from all over Ireland and Britain. It was to last until 1178.

On one occasion, St. Patrick plucked a shamrock from the grass to explain to assembled chiefs that by its triple leaf and single stem it represented in a rough way the concept of the Holy Trinity.

His missionary work brought him into constant conflict with the pagan Druid priests and more than one attempt was made to kill him.

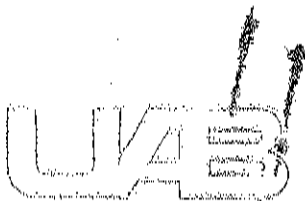

Dear Mr. Brandli:

Thank you very much for your letter of March 10, 1976, advising us of your intention to include the Austen Riggs Center in your will. As you can imagine, this is good news for any institution such as the Center which has a very limited endowment. We are in the process of establishing the Erik Erikson Research Fund which is designed to expand our research capabilities in the broad area of emotional illnesses. Your bequest could quite naturally be applied to this Fund.

We have no set form for the wording of bequests, and I would suggest that whoever draws your will can use the standard wording for making bequests to institutions. He would want to know that we are tax exempt under the Internal Revenue Code 501(c)(3) regulation. A copy of the letter attesting to this is enclosed.

We have noted your correct address and have changed our records accordingly.

I personally know Dr. Seton, although he left here before I joined the staff. As you may know, I came to the Center in 1967, a year after the death of Dr. Robert Knight. We have continued our emphasis on the psychotherapy of emotional illnesses. Almost all of the patients who come here now have been treated elsewhere and come here as something of a "last resort." They are for the most part young--median age about twenty-one--and they are badly in need of help. The great majority remain here for a year or more because of our emphasis on the development of a therapeutic relationship, a procedure requiring much time. Dr. Margaret Brenman, Dr. Joseph Chassell, Dr. Edgerton Howard, Dr. Stuart Miller, and Dr. Ess A. White, Jr., continue to be on the staff. Professor Erikson, who now spends the winters in California, continues to serve on the Board of Trustees and to act as a consultant in research.

Once again, we are very pleased to learn of your continuing interest in the Center and thank you very much for your wish to contribute further to our program.



Gentlemen:

It is the opinion of this office, based upon the evidence presented, that you are exempt from Federal income tax as an organization, described in section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1954, as it is shown that you are organized and operated exclusively for charitable and educational purposes.

Accordingly, you are not required to file income tax returns unless you change the character of your organization, the purposes for which you were organized, or your method of operation. Any such changes should be reported immediately to the District Director of Internal Revenue for your district in order that their effect upon your exempt status may be determined.

You are required, however, to file an information return, Form 990A, annually, with the District Director of Internal Revenue for your district so long as this exemption remains in effect. This form may be obtained from the District Director and is required to be filed on or before the fifteenth day of the fifth month following the close of your annual accounting period.

Contributions made to you are deductible by the donors in computing their taxable income in the manner and to the extent provided by section 170 of the 1954 Code.

Bequests, legacies, devises or transfers to or for your use are deductible in computing the value of the taxable estate of a decedent for Federal estate tax purposes in the manner and to the extent provided by sections 2055 and 2106 of the 1954 Code. Gifts of property to or for your use are deductible in computing taxable gifts for Federal gift tax purposes in the manner and to the extent provided by section 2522 of the 1954 Code.

No liability is incurred by you for the taxes imposed under the Federal Insurance Contributions Act (social security taxes) unless you have filed a waiver of exemption certificate in accordance with the applicable provisions of such Act. In the event

you desire social security coverage for your employees or have any questions relating to the filing of a waiver of exemption certificate you should take the matter up with your District Director of Internal Revenue.

Your attention is called to the provisions of section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1954 under which your exemption will be revoked if any substantial part of your activities consists of carrying on propaganda, or otherwise attempting, to influence legislation, or if you participate in, or intervene in (including the publishing or distributing of statements), any political campaign on behalf of any candidate for public office.

For the purpose of applying this ruling to any period with respect to which the Internal Revenue Code of 1954 is not applicable, any reference herein to a provision of the 1954 Code shall be deemed a reference to the corresponding provision of the 1939 Code.

The District Director of Internal Revenue, Boston, Massachusetts, is being advised of this action.

This ruling affirms our ruling of August 13, 1953, wherein you were held to be exempt from Federal income tax under the provisions of section 101(6) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1939.

At its annual meeting on May 22, the Board of Trustees elected Dr. Robert Coles member of the Board of the Austen Riggs Center.

Robert Coles, whose special interest is field work in social psychiatry, is a Research Psychiatrist for the Harvard University Health Services.

Born on October 12, 1929, in Boston, Massachusetts, Dr. Coles received the A.B. from Harvard in 1950 and the M.D. degree from Columbia University College of Physicians and Surgeons in 1954. He served as intern at the University of Chicago Clinics (1954-55), as psychiatric resident at the Massachusetts General Hospital (1955-56) and at McLean Hospital (1956-57), and as child psychiatric resident at the Judge Baker Guidance Center, Children's Hospital (1957-58).

In 1957-58 Dr. Coles served as staff member in charge of the girls' section, Children's Unit, Metropolitan State Hospital, and was on the staff of the alcoholism clinic, Massachusetts General Hospital. From 1955-58 he was a Teaching Fellow in Psychiatry, Harvard Medical School, and from 1958-60 he served in the USAF as chief of neuropsychiatric service and wards of Keesler Hospital, Biloxi, Mississippi.

In 1960-61 he was a child psychiatric fellow at the Judge Baker Guidance Center and in 1961 a psychiatric consultant at the Lancaster Industrial School for Girls. From 1961-63 he served as research psychiatrist to the Southern Regional Council on "Psychiatric Aspects of Desegregation in the South" and since 1963 has served as Consultant to the Council. He has served as Consultant to the Appalachian Volunteers since 1965. Since 1965 he has been a member of the National Advisory Committee on Farm Labor and is presently a member of the National Sharecropper's Fund.

He is a member of the American Psychiatric Association, the Group for the Advancement of Psychiatry, and Phi Beta Kappa. He is a contributing editor to THE NEW REPUBLIC, APERTURE, THE AMERICAN POETRY REVIEW and is a member of the editorial board of THE AMERICAN SCHOLAR.

Dr. Coles is the author of over 500 articles, reviews, and monographs written for periodicals, newspapers, and anthologies. Some 25 books include: CHILDREN OF CRISIS (in three volumes), ERIK H. ERIKSON: THE GROWTH OF HIS WORK, THE MIDDLE AMERICANS, A FAREWELL TO THE SOUTH, THE OLD ONES OF NEW MEXICO, and IRONY IN THE MIND'S LIFE. Five children's books include: DEAD END SCHOOL, SAVING FACE, and HEADSPARKS.

Awards that Dr. Coles has received include: the Ralph Waldo Emerson Prize of Phi Beta Kappa (1967), the Anisfield-Wolf Award in Race

Relations of the Saturday Review (1968), the Hofheimer Award of the American Psychiatric Association (1968), and awards for Volume II and Volume III of CHILDREN OF CRISIS include: the McAlpin Medal of the National Association of Mental Health (1972), Weatherford Prize of Berea College and the Council of Southern Mountains (1973), Lillian Smith Award of the Southern Regional Council (1973), and the Pulitzer Prize (1973).

Dr. Coles and his family lived in New Mexico during 1972-73, where he was involved in field work throughout the Southwest. He is now working on the fourth and fifth volumes of CHILDREN OF CRISIS. Dr. and Mrs. Coles and their three young sons live in Concord, Massachusetts.

THIRD: I give and bequeath all my remaining personal and household effects of every kind, including furniture, furnishings, objects of art, books and silverware which I may own at the time of my death to such of my grandchildren, MARY ELIZABETH BRANDLI and JOHN DANNER BRANDLI, JR., as shall survive me, and the issue me surviving of such of my said grandchildren as shall have predeceased me, to be divided among them in equal shares, per stirpes, in such manner as they shall agree upon, or failing agreement for any reason whatsoever, then as my Executor hereinafter named shall determine, any determination so made by my said Executor to be binding and conclusive upon all persons interested in my estate and not to be subject to review.

FOURTH: If my husband, HENRY E. BRANDLI, survives me, I give, devise and bequeath unto him, but only from assets included in my gross estate for Federal estate tax purposes or assets received in exchange therefor, an amount equal to the maximum estate tax marital deduction allowable in determining the Federal estate tax payable by reason of my death diminished by the value for Federal estate tax purposes of all other items in my gross estate which qualify for said deduction and which pass or have passed to my said husband (the words "pass or have passed" shall have the same meaning as such words shall have under the provisions of

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the computations necessary to determine such amount, the final determinations in the Federal estate tax proceedings shall control.

FIFTH: All the rest, residue and remainder of my property, real, personal and mixed, of every nature and wheresoever situate, including lapsed legacies and devises of which I may die seized or possessed, or to or over which I have any power of appointment or disposition at the time of my death, I give, devise, bequeath and appoint as follows:

(A) One-half (1/2) thereof to my son, HENRY EDWARD BRANDLI, JR., if he survives me, or, if he shall not survive me, then I direct that this one-half (1/2) share be added to and be disposed of in accordance with subdivision (B) of this paragraph FIFTH hereof.

(B) One-half (1/2) thereof, or in the event my son, Henry Edward Brandli, Jr., shall not survive me, then all of my residuary estate, to my son, JOHN DANNER BRANDLI, if he survives me, or, if he shall not survive me, then to his issue me surviving, in equal shares, per stirpes.

SIXTH: If any principal of my estate shall become payable to a minor, my Executor may in his absolute discretion either pay over such principal at any time to the guardian of the property of such minor or retain such principal for such minor during minority. In case of such retention my Executor may make such investments and

Except as otherwise provided in this Will, any such principal so retained, and any income therefrom, which is not applied under the provisions of this paragraph, shall be paid over to such beneficiary upon attaining majority, or if he or she shall sooner die, to his or her estate. In holding any principal or income for such minor, my Executor shall have all the powers and discretion herein conferred upon him in the administration of my estate.

SEVENTH: I nominate and appoint my husband, HENRY E. BRANDLI, to be Executor of this my Last Will and Testament, and in the event of my said husband's death, resignation, disqualification or failure for any cause to act as Executor, then I nominate and appoint my sons, JOHN DANNER BRANDLI or HENRY EDWARD BRANDLI, JR., in that order, to act as substitute or successor Executor.

EIGHTH: I hereby direct that no bond or undertaking or other security shall be required in any jurisdiction of my Executor acting hereunder, either by reason of non-residence in any State or District wherein my Will shall be required to be proved or for any other cause

(8) In general, to exercise all powers in the management of my estate which any individual could exercise in the management of similar property owned in his own right, upon such terms and conditions as to him may seem best, and to execute and deliver any and all instruments and to do all acts which he may deem necessary or proper to carry out the purpose of this my Will.

(6) Except to the extent prohibited by law, to cause to be registered in the name of his nominees, any securities from time to time held by him or to retain any securities in such condition that they will pass by delivery;

(7) To distribute in cash or in kind, or partly in cash and partly in kind, upon any division of my estate; and

(8) In general, to exercise all powers in the management of my estate which any individual could exercise in the management of similar property owned in his own right, upon such terms and conditions as to him may seem best, and to execute and deliver any and all instruments and to do all acts which he may deem necessary or proper to carry out the purpose of this my Will.
